Running Lobster Lines in W. Prince

Lobster fishermen at Alberton South and Tignish commenced running their lines Saturday morning after being delayed three days owing to drift ice in the Gulf and by evening a fair number of traps had been set. A wind change in the afternoon brought a return of a complete standstill as a return of ice was feared with the loss of all gear on the fishing grounds. Ice did not appear, however, and a fine day today will see great inroads into the huge piles of traps on the wharves at Alberton and Tignish areas. Bait still remains scarce but is being laid every day in the Casco Bay and no hold-up is expected in running lines owing to shortage of bait.

PARIS, May 3 - (Reuters) - Spike heels, low-cut vamps, novelty trimming and gay colors are features of the summer shoes made for this season's crisp cotton dresses.

Beside the classic hand-made shoe which changes little from season to season and costs a small fortune, the light airy novelty model has come into its own.

Laure, well-known Parisian shoemaker, has built the major part of this year's summer collection around the pump.

New effects appear in open toes which are cut squarely across, matching the line of the low vamp. Bright colors and amusing trimmings lend infinite variety.

Cornflower blue kid is used for one pair which is primly buttoned across the vamp with small mother-of-pearl buttons. Another pair in white suede works the chevron pattern, with tiny jingling bells.

A pair of navy-blue kid pumps features the new fashion of wide-open toes.

Jordan, who makes most of the shoes worn by the mannequins in the Paris collections, features his closed-heel pump for year-round wear.

Low-cut vamps, extremely pointed toes and thin French heels which taper to a dime-sized point often recall 1920 models.

Embroidery and lace designs are used for dressier shoes. Metallic leathers, which skyrocketed to fame last summer, continued to be popular.

Unlike Jordan, Joseph Casale favors the open-toed, open-backed shoe. The strip-tease shoe, without any back, is his favorite.

One of the first shoe makers to stress fabric in shoes, Madame Greco, continues her popular Kashmir and Paisley treatment.

Waste-Gate At Crapaud Dam Swept Away

Sometime Friday night or early Saturday morning, the waste-gate holding back the water that forms Crapaud mill pond was unexpectedly swept away. As far as could be learned yesterday no one in the area knew what had happened until the next morning when daylight revealed that the wooden waste-gate through which passed the main overflow of water, had been carried about 50 feet down stream from its original position in the mill dam. The great gap caused in the dam quickly allowed the large reservoir of water to flow to the sea, leaving only a big muddy looking flat, that had shortly before been one of the most picturesque ponds on the island.

The flow of water also carried away a large stock of trout that made this one of the finest fishing spots that could be located.

Winding through the big expanse of muddy flats the channel whose revealed depth is somewhat surprising, carried the flow of water from up-stream.

The well known "deep-hole" at the base of the water-fall from the pond, has been completely filled with stones, clay, and silt carried to that spot by the rush of water.

An inspection yesterday revealed that timbers facing the part of the dam were weakened by age, and this may have been responsible in whole or part, for the "wash-out" which came as a surprise, in view of the fact that the dam had withstood the rush of water occasioned by the spring thaw and appeared to have been in excellent condition.

This mill site was the scene of a fire this spring that destroyed a large woodworking plant belonging to Mr. Jack Leard who had operated the plant for many years.

A few weeks after the fire Mr. Leard sold the mill site to Mr. Elmer MacDonald, who operated another mill building on this site, and the loss of the dam comes as a serious blow to Mr. MacDonald so soon after the opening of his new business.

New Executive Set-up Adopted By Drama Festival

SAINT JOHN, N. B., May 4 - (CP) - A new executive set-up was adopted Saturday by governors of the Dominion Drama Festival. A president is to be appointed on recommendation of the British Columbia regional committee. This office will be equivalent to the previous position of honorary chairman, held since 1947 by D. Park Jamieson, Q.C., Sarnia, Ont.

Governor-General Massey is patron of the organization, founded by the Earl of Bessborough, and Lieutenant-Governor Clarence Wallace of British Columbia is honorary president.

Honorary vice-presidents are Lieutenant-Governor D. L. MacLaren of New Brunswick, Lieutenant-Governor Caspard Fautoux of Quebec, and Mr. Jamieson.

New Well Connected To S'ide Water System

Over the week end the new six hundred foot well on Central Street at the base of the stand pipe was connected to the main line feeding into the town water supply. The cut-in took place yesterday morning at about eleven o'clock and during the afternoon a number of citizens, at the invitation of Water Commissioners Leigh Stewart and Robert Dewar, were invited to view the recently installed Byron Jackson pump which pumps the water from this well into the main reservoir.

Water Commissioners Stewart and Dewar said yesterday that although the exact number of gallons per minute now available would not be known until accurate tests were made it was expected that the supply would be between 1100 and 1300 gallons and that they, they estimated, more than sufficient for any emergency.

As stated the cut-in on Harvard Street yesterday was a test and as soon as certain pipe line adjustments are made the well will be officially declared open and in use by the town.

Red Cross Blood Clinics Start Today

The convey of three bright blue vehicles, now a familiar sight in the Maritimes, arrived in Charlottetown last evening with the staff and equipment for the four Red Cross Blood Donor Clinics to be held in this province during the week. Dr. W. P. Earle, newly appointed Medical Director of the Maritime Depot of the Red Cross Blood Transfusion Service at Halifax, is in charge of the team which comprises two nurses, six nurses' aides, one laboratory technician and three drivers. While in the province Dr. Earle will confer with Dr. J. H. Shaw and other medical men in addition to being present at the clinics.

The first of this week's clinics will be held today and tomorrow at Red Cross Headquarters in Charlottetown when 500 donors are required. It has been suggested that unnecessary waiting might be avoided if those whose A to K were to come on Monday afternoon or evening and those between L and Z on Tuesday afternoon or evening. These two afternoon and two evening clinics will provide a good opportunity for those from outside areas who are in Charlottetown for the Music Festival to set aside a half hour of their time to be donors at one of the clinics and thereby help Charlottetown to go "over the top."

On Wednesday and Thursday clinics will be held at the R. C. A. F. Station in Kennington and at Summerside when the objective will be 450 donors to make up the total minimum objective of 950.
