Figures Indicate Big Tourist Season

Complete figures will not be available for some time yet but partial figures indicate that Prince Edward Island has just had one of its busiest tourist seasons, according to Mr. George V. Fraser, Director of the Government's Tourist and Information Branch.

September this year may bring some few more victims to the Province as a result of a promotion program being done along that line and the hunters will be back again in October to swell the total for the whole season.

However, when Labor Day rolls around bringing with it the reopening of schools across Canada and the United States the foreign license plates begin to disappear from the Island. The Labor Day week-end just finished brought the customary influx of visitors but these will be returning to their homes during the coming week.

One of the best indications of the volume of traffic during the past two months are the figures kept by the ferries at Borden and Wood Islands. These are available up to August 30 and show a definite increase in the number of visitors to Prince Edward Island this summer. Cars coming into the Province during July and August this year showed an increase of 2,248 over the same period last year.

The same is true of registrations at the Travel Bureau in Charlottetown. In July of this year there were 411 more signatures in the visitors book than there were in July of 1950. The increase in August this year over the same month of 1950 was 875. Total registrations in the Travel Bureau's book during July and August this summer were 4,463. However, many persons do not visit the Bureau during their visit to the province. They get their literature from the Bureau in the mails before coming to the Island, pick it up at the Aulac Bureau, or get it on the ferries and go direct to the resorts for a quiet holiday.

"The past year has been one of steady progress and gratifying results. Our Comrades in Alberton rank with their comrades in Summerside in establishing in their town a fine new home. Comrade Bob Dunn and the members of Alberton Branch have proved themselves worthy members of the Canadian Legion and have made their branch a banner example to our other branches in their attainments in 1950-51.

"Prince County has shown us this year what a small branch and a large branch can do if the members buckle down and work. I hope the examples set in Alberton and Summerside will be a 'shot in the arm' to others and that before long our comrades in the other provinces will add to the many complimentary nick-names of our Province 'The show-place of the Canadian Legion.'

"During my tenure of office there were only two meetings of our Provincial Command Executive. Guest Speaker
"Today we have with us Joseph K. Kennedy, End Vice-President, Dominion Command who will speak to you on a subject vital to the Legion and to all veterans of all wars. This subject concerns 'The Basic Rate of Disability Pensions.' I do not wish to take away from Comrade Kennedy's thunder and I will only refer to this most important subject briefly. In 1947 the Canadian Legion won for Canada's war veterans the 25% increase in the basic rate of pensions.

"This was essential in view of the then high cost of living. 1951 finds the cost of living many indices higher than 1947. Many of our disabled comrades are suffering from want as a result of the continuing inflation.

"The Government proposal at the last session of the House of Commons of a stop-gap provision of \$2,000,000.00 for assistance against inflation.

"The Empire Club has subject on both occasions being 'The Political Situation in Great Britain.' On Monday, October 1st, he is speaking to the Canadian Club in Montreal on 'The Political Situation in Western Europe.'

"I further introduces the means test into our pension statutes, a principle which has never been considered in pensions legislation anywhere. I would ask you to give your most earnest attention to Comrade Kennedy's words when he speaks to you today. The question is vital, our support should be unanimous.

"Finally, Comrades, I wish to extend my sincere thanks to the members of the Executive, to Jim Walker, to Miss Mayme Meurant, and to the branch officers and members for the excellent support they have accorded me this year. I think we have had a good year in Legion work. We have a great task and grave responsibilities, let us assume them as men."

British M. P. Touring Canada

LONDON, Aug. 30.—One of Britain's most active M. P.s, Ernest Marples, Conservative Member of Parliament for Wallasey, arrives in Canada at Vancouver on September 1st.

Mr. Marples entered Parliament in 1945, winning Wallasey for the Conservatives from the sitting Independent Member by 3,810 votes. His majority in 1950 was 14,015. He is Secretary of the Conservative Parliamentary Housing Committee and has taken part in many of the debates on Housing in which subject he has specialized. He wrote of the Conservative "Housing" Pamphlet in November, 1950, he moved and Mr. Churchill wound up the Opposition's official amendment to the King's Speech.

While in Canada, Mr. Marples will speak at the Victoria Kiwanis Club on September 4th and at the Vancouver Board of Trade Council Meeting on September 6th. In Regina, on September 17th, he will address the Rotary Club and in Winnipeg, on September 18th.
