Blue Bonnets Race Track To Receive Alterations

By JOE DUPUIS MONTREAL (CP)—Blue Bonnets race track, once described by owner J. Louis Levesque as having better facilities for horses than for people, is going to be spent on a heated glass-walled grandstand capable of seating 10,000 persons. The present, obsolete 3,000-seat bleacher section, a constant source of irritation to Levesque, will be torn down.

"We've been working on this project for three years now," Levesque told a press conference Thursday. "We were going to wait a few more years, but we're going ahead with the whole thing."

The other major project will be a new track, seven-eighths of a mile long, or three-eighths of a mile long, but Levesque said the longer track is desired to attract a better class of thoroughbred runners.

Other improvements include landscaping and installation of a new water clock. The work will start in July, 1965, at the completion of the flat racing program. Blue Bonnets will shut down for 10 months while the re-improvements are completed, re-opening in time for the start of the 1966 season.
