ABOARD THE TRUMAN TRAIN, Sept. 2—(AP)—President Truman accused the Eisenhower camp today of increasing the risk of an atomic war with Russia by playing "cruel, gutter politics" with foreign policy. While stopping his way back to the capital from Milwaukee on a campaign trip for Adlai Stevenson, Truman let loose at what he termed "Republican snollygosters" and "masterminds" he accused of trying to teach Dwight D. Eisenhower how to be a hypocrite in a few easy lessons. Later Truman explained he heard the word "snollygoster" from his father and understood it meant "political shyster."

Texan Makes Statement To Oil Compact

BANFF, Alta., Sept. 2—(CP)—Governor Allan Shivers of Texas said today the United States faces an inevitable shortage of petroleum unless more reserves are found and there is an improvement in its production recovery. Gov. Shivers addressed the interstate oil compact commission meeting which opened here today with more than 300 delegates present, including leaders of the Canadian and U. S. petroleum industry. This is the first time the conservation group has met in Canada.

American Sailor Rescued By Canadian Pilot

NORFOLK, Va., Sept. 2—(AP)—A United States naval officer was swept off the destroyer U. S. S. Norris at sea yesterday and was rescued by a helicopter piloted by an R.C.A.F. flier. A sailor who also fell overboard was picked up by a destroyer. Atlantic fleet headquarters reported today the rescues occurred as the ships were en route to European waters to take part in "main brace", the first joint exercises to be held by fleets from countries of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

At Least 558 Deaths In States Over Week-End

CHICAGO, Sept. 2—(AP)—At least 558 persons met violent death in the United States during the Labor Day week-end, a final survey indicated today. This was 100 less than the toll of accidental deaths during the same 1951 holiday period.

Plan World Food Reserve

ROME, Sept. 2—(AP)—A five-country committee went to work today to plan a world food reserve. The committee, representing Britain, Australia, India, the United States and France, will work out proposals for a famine-emergency reserve plan on a world-wide scale.

Pearson Says Danger To Peace Has Not Decreased

TORONTO, Sept. 2—(CP)—External Affairs Minister Pearson said today that the danger to peace and the threat to freedom remains as menacing as ever. "There may be an easing of the situation here or a deterioration there," he said, "but the menace of Soviet imperialism exploiting the doctrine of revolutionary Communism with its conscious agents in the members of every Communist Party in the world—including the one in Canada—that menace remains for delivery at a directors luncheon at the Canadian National Exhibition, he said: "We should never forget for one moment that we are facing the cruellest, most powerful, best organized conspiracy in all history."

New Governor General For Australia Appointed

LONDON, Sept. 2—(Reuters)—Appointment of Field Marshal Sir William Slim, chief of the Imperial General Staff, as Governor-General of Australia was approved by the Queen today. Prime Minister Robert Menzies of Australia announced the appointment earlier at Canberra. Slim, whose term as staff chief ends in November, is expected to go to Australia early next year.

Commonwealth Party Of Parliamentarians Due Tonight

A group of approximately 45 delegates from all parts of the world to the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association will arrive here by train tonight for a two day visit to this Province. They will meet at the station by a number of members of the Provincial Cabinet. Tomorrow morning they will pay the customary courtesy calls and during their visit to Confederation Chamber will meet the rest of the members of the Legislative Council. They will then call on His Honor Lieutenant Governor T.W.L. Prowse before going to visit the Bunbury Farm of Premier J. Walter Jones.

U. S. Miners End Holiday

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 2—(AP)—United States coal miners ended their 1952 memorial holiday by picking up tools and re-entering the pits after a 10-day mourning period for victims of mine tragedies. But in western Pennsylvania, eastern Kentucky and Tennessee the memorial holiday was extended by refusal of thousands of miners to return to work.

Says NATO Bar To Soviet Aggression

TRAIL, B. C., Sept. 2—(CP)—Prime Minister St. Laurent told a Chamber of Commerce dinner here last night that the North Atlantic Treaty Organization is the only bar to Soviet aggression in the world today. He acknowledged that the action of the United Nations in Korea may have deterred Russia from aggression in Europe but he had more faith in N.A.T.O. as a way of preventing a third world war.

BRIDGEWATER, N.S., Sept. 2—(CP)—A Canadian National Railway train ripped into a car near here tonight, killing the driver and sending his three teen-age passengers to hospital in serious condition. Police said Ernest Sach, 18, of New Germany was apparently driving home when he collided with the train, en route here from Middleton, on a flat crossing near Cook's Bridge.

Will Use Veto As Lever To Gain Own Demands

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Sept. 2—(AP)—Russia's Jacob Malik served firm notice today the Soviet Union will cast its veto as often as necessary to bar applications for U. N. membership unless the west accepts a 14-country package proposal made by Moscow. The western powers have denounced the Russian proposal as a "horse-trade" and insisted they will not accept it.

British Labor Convention Rebuffs Leftist Bids For Cuts In Rearmament

MARGATE, England, Sept. 2—(Reuters)—Organized labor today turned down a bid by left-winger Aneurin Bevan for leadership of the Labor Party. Chiefs of the Trades Union Congress, which controls five-sixths of the Labor Party membership, overwhelmingly rejected Bevanite and other left-wing resolutions for cuts in Britain's rearmament. If the Bevan motion had passed, it would in effect have committed the trade union movement to Bevan instead of the present party leader, Clement Attlee.

South Africans Go To Prison

DURBAN, South Africa, Sept. 2—(Reuters)—The president of the Natal Indian Congress and 20 other Indians and Africans—first in Natal to act in the defiance campaign against South Africa's segregation laws—went to prison for one month today. They were convicted of breaking the railway racial segregation regulations and chose prison instead of fines. The Congress president for Natal is Dr. G. M. Naicker. All 21 were arrested when they marched into a ticket office reserved for Europeans.

Death Toll In N. B. Increases

GRAND FALLS, N.B., Sept. 2—(CP)—New Brunswick's Labor Day week-end death toll rose to six today after a Lumestone, Me., youth died from injuries suffered in a highway accident near Grand Falls. Gregory Gillespie, 21, succumbed in hospital at Van Buren, Me., without regaining consciousness after the car he was driving left the road Sunday night.

Army Appeal Board Upholds Conviction

OTTAWA, Sept. 2—(CP)—The army's court-martial appeal board in a judgment today upheld the conviction of a 21-year-old Nova Scotia army signaller sentenced to 18 months in prison for the murder of a fellow Canadian soldier in Korea last January. Sigmund Robert Burns MacDonald of New Waterford, N. S., originally was sentenced to death in Seoul last March 10 for the murder of Pte. Harold Carlen Harrison, 31, of Truro, N.S.

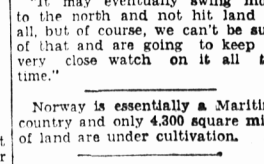
