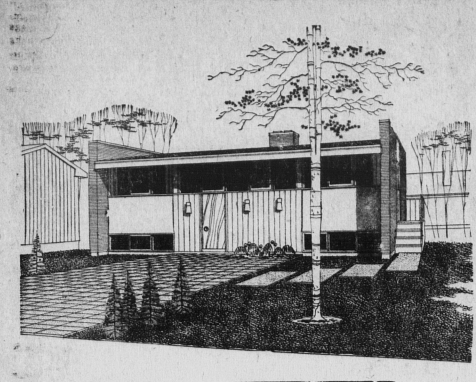


UNUSUAL DESIGN OFFERS MAXIMUM SPACE



HERE'S A BIG-FAMILY house of unusual design that offers maximum living space on two floors through use of the split-level entrance.

The unconventional in exterior design and the unusual in interior layout are distinct features of this four-bedroom house by architects Denis and Freda O'Connor of Edmonton.

The uncommon layout results in a bedroom in each corner of the house with a bathroom separating the two bedrooms on one side and a washroom, laundry and side entrance between the bedrooms on the other side.

A fireplace separates the living and kitchen areas from the dining room which overlooks a raised terrace at the rear of the house. Large windows at both the front and rear of the house provide a well-lighted interior. The lower floor provides space for a playroom, sewing room, hobby room and storage.

The first floor is 1,236 square feet and the exterior dimensions are 36 feet, 10 inches by 42 feet. Working drawings for this house, known as Design 811, are available from Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation in Moncton at minimum cost.

BESTED PARTS Particular Care Is Needed Painting Interior Of House

Interior house painting should be done with particular care. It is seldom carried out in a single operation normally there are two or three separate steps: walls and ceilings, then floors and finally the floors.

Painting plastered surfaces presents special problems. New plastered surfaces contain lime, an active alkali ingredient, which can destroy the color in certain types of paints. Builders often recommend that plastered walls be left in their natural state for a year or so before painting.

By that time the lime has become harmless. This delay also enables the home owner to have any cracks in the plaster repaired before painting. If these cracks appear after the plaster has been painted, the entire surface may have to be done over again.

**THOROUGHLY DRY**

If a home owner wants the painting done before moving in, he should make sure that newly plastered surfaces are thoroughly dry and that they are treated with a neutralizer to counteract the lime. This is especially important if oil base paints are to be used. Rubber base or "latex" paints which are soluble in water are easier to apply on a fresh plaster.

A filler or sinter is also required in some cases if the plaster is porous. The degree of absorption on plastered walls varies and if a good filler is not used it may be difficult to achieve a uniform shade of color across the whole surface.

Preparing interior woodwork for painting includes priming, shellacking or staining and filling the holes with putty or wood filler. In some woods the grain becomes open and the wood filler will damage easily. Dull or uneven application of primer coat, producing a rough surface. This may also occur on window frames. Frames primed at the factory. Ropes and bolts should be sanded smooth before applying the primer coat of paint. Amount of painting will be less if this defect. If a defect exists it is rough fill with putty and keep clean.

For a while after painting the paint will be brittle and it is best to properly dry out a number of days before any furniture should be taken when moving furniture about to avoid scratching the painted surfaces. The drying time will depend on the type of paint used.

Hardwood floors, before being varnished or waxed, are sanded with a special machine. The final application of the floor is done by hand. The skill of the person who does the sanding is essential if the grain of the wood is to be preserved or "open". Some of the chemicals contained in sealer coats and varnishes, if used in excess and prolonged exposure to these fumes may be harmful.

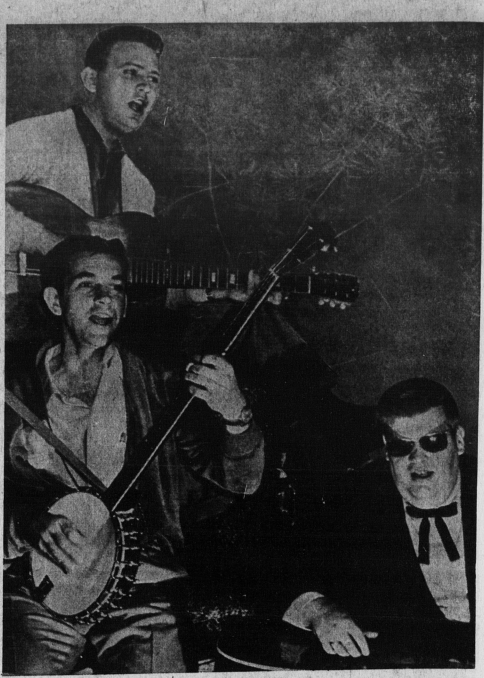
