The Elector's Choice. THE questions involved in the issue to be decided to-morrow have been presented. On the part of the Government they have been presented fully and fairly. We have no doubt that many intelligent electors regret that the Opposition Leaders did not announce a policy. If they had done so, there might be a choice between the parties. There would, at least, be something to bind both. But the Opposition party prefer to get in if they can; and to be free to work their own sweet will, if they get in! Of course, the electors of Prince Edward Island will not take them on such terms, while they can get men, bound by a policy—a clear, definite, good policy—and pointing to the excellent record they have already made as a guarantee for their future conduct.

Between the Government party with a policy, and the Opposition party without a policy; between the Government party with a good record, and the Opposition party with a bad record,—to this choice the electors are confined. We shall soon know, beyond a peradventure, which party will be chosen.

We rely with confidence upon the intelligence and prudence of the electors of Prince Edward Island for a choice in favor of the Government party—by a large majority!

ELECTORS OF Charlottetown and Royalty.

WHERE TO VOTE.

ELECTORS must bear in mind that they must vote in the Polling District where they reside, and in no other.

There will be nine Polling Districts located in Charlottetown, and two in the Royalty. These Polling Districts will be as follows:—

WARD ONE. EAST OF GREAT GEORGE STREET. The First Polling Division shall comprise all that portion of Ward Number One, in the City of Charlottetown, situate East of Great George Street; and the Poll shall be held at J. T. Mellish's, corner King and Great George Streets.

WEST OF GREAT GEORGE STREET. The Second Polling District shall comprise all that portion of Ward Number One, in the City of Charlottetown, situate West of Great George Street; and the Poll shall be held in the office of John MacEachern, Esq., Insurance Agent, Lower Queen Street.

WARDS TWO AND THREE. EAST OF GREAT GEORGE STREET. The Third Polling District shall comprise all those portions of Wards Numbers Two and Three, in the City of Charlottetown, situate East of Great George Street; and the Poll shall be held at the Dwelling House of Thos. Connolly, opposite Richard Heartz's Warehouse, Sidney Street.

WEST OF GREAT GEORGE STREET. The Fourth Polling District shall comprise all those portions of Wards Numbers Two and Three, in the City of Charlottetown, situate West of Great George Street; and the Poll shall be held at George Thorne's, Sidney Street.

WARD FOUR. EAST OF GREAT GEORGE STREET. The Fifth Polling District shall comprise all that portion of Ward Number Four, in the City of Charlottetown, situate East of Hillsborough Street; and the Poll shall be held at Matthews' Shop, opposite Prince of Wales College, Weymouth Street.

WEST OF GREAT GEORGE STREET. The Sixth Polling District shall comprise all that portion of Ward Number Four situate West of Hillsborough Street and East of Great George Street; and the Poll shall be held at or near the Athenaeum, corner of Grafton and Prince Streets.

WEST OF GREAT GEORGE STREET. The Seventh Polling District shall comprise all that portion of Ward Number Four in the said city, situate West of Great George Street; and the Poll shall be held at or near the store of J. D. McLeod, corner of Queen and Grafton Streets.

WARD FIVE. EAST OF GREAT GEORGE STREET. The Eighth Polling District shall comprise all that portion of Ward Number Five, in the said City, situate on the East of Great George Street, and also that portion of Charlottetown Common situate East of the Malpeque Road; and the Poll shall be held at or near D. R. M. Hooper's store, Easton Street.

WEST OF GREAT GEORGE STREET. The Ninth Polling District shall comprise all that portion of Ward Number Five in said City, situate to the West of Great George Street, and also that portion of Charlottetown Common situate West of the Malpeque Road; and the Poll shall be held at or near James Frederick Curtis', Head of Queen Street.

ROYALTY OF CHARLOTTETOWN. EAST OF MALPEQUE ROAD. The Tenth Polling District shall comprise all that portion of Charlottetown Royalty situate to the East of Malpeque Road, and the Poll shall be held at or near Love's Tannery, St. Peter's Road.

WEST OF MALPEQUE ROAD. The Eleventh Polling District shall comprise all that portion of Charlottetown Royalty situate to the West of the Malpeque Road; and the Poll shall be held at or near the Schoolhouse, near Gates' Mills.

Bismarck and Turkey.

The London edition of the New York Herald recently published a despatch from Constantinople which says that throughout the Afghan dispute in 1885 and 1887, Prince Bismarck used his utmost endeavor to induce Turkey, in the event of war between Russia and Turkey, to close the Dardanelles against the British fleet. Bismarck's hostility to Gladstone's Government was notorious, but in 1885, when Lord Salisbury became Prime Minister, Bismarck quickly allowed it to be understood that he viewed the change in the government of England with favor and that he would be disposed to modify the attitude which he had consistently maintained towards Gladstone's administration. In October and November, 1886, Bismarck instructed his ambassadors at Vienna and London to do all in their power to bring about an offensive and defensive alliance between Austria and Great Britain against Russia. Salisbury was sorely tempted to acquiesce in the views of the German chancellor, but, fortunately, before he consented he made enquiries at Berlin as to whether in the event of war Bismarck would pledge himself to use all his influence with the Porte and France for the British fleet to have free passage of the Dardanelles. To these enquiries he received either no answers or evasive answers. It is an undeniable fact that during the last five years Turkey has acted entirely under German inspiration.

WILL TRY ANOTHER WAY.—It is stated that a rancher of Alberta, E. W. T., residing near Calgary, has recently made a rather novel attempt at capturing a wife. It appears that while the young lady on whom he wished to bestow the best affections of his young tender heart, was visiting some friends, the ardent lover went to the place where she had been in the habit of stopping, and, apparently without much difficulty, secured possession of her trunk and a quantity of clothing and took them to his lonely domicile. The girl did not appreciate this sort of wooing, and had a warrant issued for the arrest of the enthusiastic lover, who wilted, and promised to pay all expences and return the wardrobe.

CITIES WHICH ADVERTISE.—It is said that the Vancouver World, which got out a good New Year number was well patronized by Vancouver firms, some of whom gave their orders in advance for 1000 copies. The idea was to advertise themselves and their city at the same time. Now we see that the Seattle chamber of commerce has decided, after some discussion, to purchase 5,000 copies each of the New Year's editions of the Post-Intelligencer, Press and Times. The Post says the prices to be paid are \$70 per 1000 copies for that paper, and \$40 to \$50 per 1000 for the others. This goes to show that people consider it is necessary to advertise their city abroad and the business at home, and will pay for it too.—Vancouver. B. C., Times.
