Appointed Permanent Member T. & I. Council

Mr. W. E. Agnew, director of trade with the Provincial Government, has been named permanent representative from this Province on the Provincial Government's Trade and Industry Council, according to word received yesterday from the Council's Headquarters in Toronto.

The Council is composed of members from the various Provincial Government Trade and Industry departments and officials of the Federal Government's of Trade and Commerce.

Purpose of the Provincial Government Trade and Industry Council is to further co-ordinate activities of the Provincial Government Departments engaged in the trade and industrial development of their province; to provide a medium for inter-Provincial consultation on commercial matters; to offer businessmen studying the Canadian market a co-ordinated Dominion-wide Provincial service; and finally, to encourage a greater national understanding of the economic development of all the Canadian provinces.

Mr. Agnew, as a representative on the Council from Prince Edward Island, will be able to provide a worthwhile service to the Federal Government in the development of national industrial preparedness and defense programs. He is thoroughly familiar with all aspects of trade in this Province having been director of trade with the Department of Industry and Natural Resources for the past seven years.

Decrease In Juvenile Crime

An absence of juvenile delinquency in Charlottetown last year is noted in the report of Chief of Police C. W. MacArthur, submitted at the annual meeting of the City Council last night. Only four or five cases have been dealt with by the Juvenile Court.

With the exception of one case of murder involving a charge of manslaughter, there was also very little serious crime during the year, the report states.

Arrests for the year totalled 656, a decrease of 149 from the previous year. Cases entered and disposed of in the City Police Court, including arrests, amounted to 728, with 25 dismissals, five sent to Supreme Court and 698 convictions.

The present strength of the force is 18 men, including 1 Chief, 7 Sergeants, 1 Corporal and 7 Constables.
