### GREEN GABLES WEEK

## Proposals For Tourist Entertainment Sought

A real, live 'Anne of Green Gables' Week—and be on hand for pictures by tourists during the summer season—has been proposed as a top drawer tourist attraction for the north shore area.

She would be some attractive young girl of the same approximate age as the Anne of the famous books, and would be chosen at the end of a school term to be ready to greet the thousands of admiring youngsters who would undoubtedly be drawn as to a magnet.

The Green Gables Week could easily be built into one of the province's most attractive tourist developments.

This is one of the proposals advanced by George Fraser, director of the Travel Bureau, whose wide experience in the industry has given him an excellent insight into the problems and desires of tourists.

Mr. Fraser believes the Green Gables Week could be developed into an international attraction with a full schedule of concerts, afternoon entertainment, and plays. Heading the latter would logically be a presentation by a theatre group of 'Anne of Green Gables' as the feature event of the week.

The swiftly changing picture of the tourist industry is reflected in the realization by those involved in it that it is not now a matter of getting people to come here.

Big problem facing the industry today is that of finding new means of entertainment for those who visit and spend the money, which has placed tourism third in the economy of the province.

Apparently a great majority of summer visitors are no longer looking for the "happenings" they sought in another generation. In the modern, fast-moving age they demand many forms of entertainment—variety to give them a choice.

Realizing this, the P.E.I. Tourist Association recently advertised for ideas and suggestions regarding provision for "more means of diversion and entertainment".

Apparently there are many things which can be done to amuse tourists while they are here, and those primarily concerned with getting them to the province have definite ideas based on years of practical experience in dealing with visitors and hearing their comments.

Hon. J.D. Stewart, minister of tourist development, believes there are many things which the individual towns or villages as well as the tourist operators could be doing in this field.

The communities should be primarily concerned in seeing that at least one big event is staged in their area each year as a community project. The operators should be concerned with having special events at least weekly for their own visitors.

Such things as old fashion hay rides, barn dances, cook-outs—right on the shore after digging or catching the food to be cooked, special evening barbecues, strawberry festivals, and a variety of similar schemes can be used.

All of them offer entertainment, activity, amusement and fun to fill the vacation days and evenings.

In the field of general tourist attractions there are also some solid suggestions for boards of trade or similar community-minded organizations such as service clubs to consider.

There are many others which can best be handled by the small communities themselves.

Among the brighter offerings is a proposal for a top drawer historical pageant in this city on July 1, Dominion Day, to celebrate the birth of this nation.

It could have a re-enactment of the first meeting of those who became the Fathers of Confederation, reproducing the colorful costumes and setting of the times.

The day could be filled with band concerts in the open and a mammoth street dance using the oval in front of the Provincial.

Building with the areas of Great George and Richmond streets for the overflow of dancers.

A spring trout-fishing derby, to be run on at least three successive weekends, could attract anglers from many places, particularly Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, if prizes and honors

were sufficiently attractive. Rural horse racing could be revived, with events for small purses for horses perhaps not quite good enough for the faster tracks, but still able to offer plenty of excitement for their farmer owners. The success being enjoyed by the group around Pinette is a fine example of what could be accomplished.

The taking over and establishment of the Highland Summer School could be a real project for operators on the North Shore as could provision for summer theatre there.

The Evening Patriot Gold Cup and Saucer Parade could easily

be built into one of the biggest attractions on record, and this suggestion is borne out by the interest already being taken in making this year's parade a far greater event than the inaugural last year.

It has been noted that all too often Wednesday afternoons are a "blind spot" in events, and these could be filled by many things, including more fairs and festivals in different sections of the province on those days.

More festivals, fairs, and aquatic events scheduled for these days would brighten the picture considerably. For instance, a big water carnival

and festival at Alberton could attract hundreds of visitors to the western part of the island. By the same token, a large scale fisheries exposition at Souris would accomplish the same thing for the eastern area.

## Wellington Rink To Have Opening

SUMMERSIDE — The newly-completed Richmond-Wellington indoor rink will be officially opened this Thursday evening in a formal ceremony attended by Hon. Henry Wedge, provincial minister of welfare and labor, and a member of the Legislative Assembly representing this district.

The official opening will be performed by Mr. Wedge, and will precede a hockey match between teams from Wellington and Grand River.

This new community rink was a project of the winter works program, and involved the conversion of the former horse shed beside the Roman Catholic Church at Wellington Centre, midway between Wellington and Richmond.

As part of the reconstruction project, a promenade was built on the west side of the rink, and dressing rooms were built on the north end of the building. Ice space at the new rink is 147 by 46 feet.

Allan Cameron is ice maker and caretaker at the rink and its operation is directed by a committee composed by Fred J. MacDonald, Ray Brown, Ralph MacLellan, John Edward Cameron and Edmund L. Arsenault.

A local hockey league has been formed with teams entered from Lot 11, Wellington, St. Nicholas, Grand River, Elmont Bay and Mont Carmel.

A school league is also being organized, and regular school skating is conducted for the enjoyment of students, as well as skating programs for adults.

## Ferry Group To Confer With Irving

ALBERTON — The president of West-Point Ferries Ltd., P. M. MacCaull of Ellerslie and Robert Grindlay, M.L.A. plan to fly to Saint John this morning to discuss the proposed new ferry service with New Brunswick industrialist, K.C. Irving.
