Her Infectious Laughter Rippled Through The Air

Getting off sticks to a sawmill - this was the interest of farming to the name today. Trucks piled to and from the woods yard back in a field, bearing away the logs, and bring home in return the sawed lumber. "Now where can we get something red to tie on the end of that longest stick to mark it for the road?" one of the lads queried of a load about to roll down the lane.

James grinned. The June-time had an exciting way of reviving old memories.

"Your grandmother as a girl had a red dress," he offered. "There may be pieces of it left yet!"

It was made, as we remembered, from a length of flannel of a creamy hue which had been dipped in a blood-red bath by mother-to-us. In her busy-ness, it was passed on to the hands of a much loved aunt who returned from years spent in the States to live out the western time in a snug home in the village within a stone's throw almost of her- and our - girlhood home. An ex-schoolma'am, she was truly a lady of parts. She had hands that could turn readily and well, to the old-time arts and crafts of the housewife, a mind well stocked with learnings and lore, and a brave and kindly heart. Her laugh was a lovely ripple, warm and bright and infectious.

At James' words, we recalled not so much the concentration and ingenuity which went to the making of that girl's dress, though we generally followed that with some suppressed and maidenly excitement, but that sunny Saturday we spent at her house.

Autumn was commencing to tint the trees then, and its gentle and rather lazy haze shimmered over the fields. Below that crossed the Point Road from the field, and slipped away into the wild-marsh grasses of the tidal river, we could see the white of wild asters. And cuddled in the nooks of the gray-railed and near roadside fence, goldenrods blossomed. Hawthorns in a hedge toward the smithy were fruited in a like shade to that of our dress - to-be.

It was a peaceful spot there where we visited, a sanctuary if ever, its pair apart from the busier occupations of those times. In the garden, the husband was gathering up in neat heaps to dry.
