Their judgment agreed exactly with that of the judges at Canada's leading fairs who

made the official awards. The two brothers were members of a group of eight competitors who had perfect scores amongst the 595 4-H boys and girls from all parts of Canada who took part in the contest. Raymond tied for first prize at the Holstein Judging Day at Falconwood in 1957 and three times in the past five years has had a

first prize placing for his calf in the Dunstaffnage-Frenchcove 4-H Club. He has also regularly shown his calf club calves as yearlings. Donnie is in his second year of 4-H work and stood first in a class of eight with his yearlings, while his calf was fourth in the club. The boys are from York, P.E.I.

Guy Thompson is secretary of the same club and three years ago was tied for first place in P.E.I. in the Junior Judging contest. He too, has also won a prize in each of the past three years. Last year he was second for showmanship in his club. Ruth LeLacheur is a 14-year-old member of the New Perth 4-H Club. She won three second prizes at the club Achievement Day, one each for showmanship, judging and on her calf.

15-year-old Wayne Dickieson is a member of the New Glasgow 4-H Club, of which he is president. In two years as a member of the club he has been first on the year's work, first in judging, first in showmanship, second on the year's work, second in judging and first on his calf. 13-year-old Wendall Shaw is a member of the O'Leary 4-H Club in which he stood first with his calf and first on the year's work.
