The British Board of Trade returns for June show the exports increased £3,870,344 compared with June, 1879, the greatest increases being in iron, steel and cotton manufactures. The imports increased £9,668,913.

Large quantities of pressed hay are being shipped to England from Montreal. Large quantities of the same article might, no doubt, be shipped from Bay Fundy ports. But it will be wiser to turn that hay into beef, and ship to England a greatly increased number of superior cattle.

Wife-beating has become very prevalent in Toronto and some other Upper-Canadian cities. The newspapers have begun to comment on the rapid increase of this species of crime. It is argued that imprisonment has no effect in deterring the wife beater, while either imprisonment or the imposition of a fine tends to add to the misery of the victim, which is probably the case in the majority of instances. One of the Quebec papers—the *Chronicle*, advocates flogging for the wife beater, on the ground that like "cures like."

The trade of Manitoba with Eastern Canada is rapidly increasing. In June of this year, the imports into Winnipeg from the Eastern Provinces were valued at \$391,433, and for the year ending June 30th at \$3,599,980, whereas, the imports into the same place during the previous year from the same Provinces were valued at \$2,266,985.

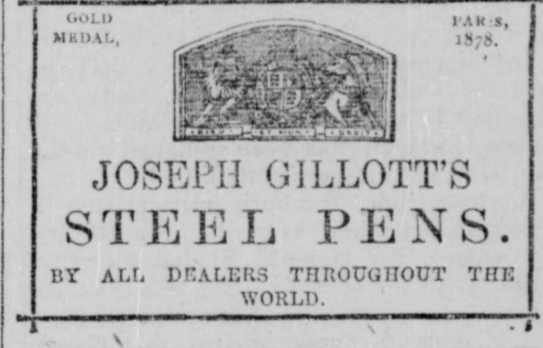
