Mount Allison Sunday was fittingly commemorated on the O'Leary pastoral charge of the United Church on Sunday, Feb. 18th, with special services conducted by the minister, Rev. W. G. Dickson. The Maritime Conference of the church is endeavouring to raise the sum of four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) to help Mount Allison University. The graduates and alumni are also being appealed to and also a special names list. The objective of all these appeals together is eight hundred thousand dollars (\$800,000) and it is hoped to make Mount Allison debt free in 1954. The amounts are payable over a three year period. The allocation for Prince Edward Island is forty five thousand dollars, and the objective of the O'Leary charge is one thousand dollars, and already over eight hundred dollars has been given in cash and pledges by the people of Bloomfield, O'Leary, Brae and West Devon congregations of the United Church. In the spring when another canvass is undertaken on the O'Leary charge, it is hoped to complete the allocation of \$1000. In his sermons the minister enumerated the following lamps which the church college, like Mount Allison University, seeks to give its students, numbering about twelve hundred: Truth, Memory, Sacrifice, Power, Beauty and Life.

Annual Meeting Of Dunk River Dairying Company

The annual meeting of Dunk River Dairying Company was held in Central Bedouque Hall on February 14th with a large number of patrons and shareholders present. The president, Mr. Scott Cairns, presided and opened the meeting with a brief address summarizing the activities of the Company during the past year.

He drew attention to a decline in cream production during the fall months which had resulted in a decrease of 11,700 pounds in the year's butter make as compared with 1949, which no doubt was the result of the low floor price of butter in comparison with the high cost of mill feeds and concentrates, and the farmers did not resort to supplements when the pastures began to fall. A new churn was installed during the year, and an up to date moulding and wrapping machine that will mould and wrap more desirable prints (the size now most desired) on our plant. The termakers had again won first place for the quality of their butter.

The financial statement and auditor's report for the year were read by the secretary, showing that \$172,423 had been paid to the patrons. The ten highest patrons for the year were Messrs. Elmer Scott Cairns, \$2,127.14, winning the Canadian Bank of Commerce tray; the P. L. Morris Feed Service Mills tray; Frank Jardine, \$2,060.03 for having the highest production in the creamery over a five year period amounting to a total of 20,855.42 lbs. of butter fat and a cash value of \$13,813.54, won the Maple Leaf Milling Co.'s tray; Ruben Large and Son, \$2,103.09; Norman MacMurdo, \$2,196.68; Herbert Craig, \$2,135.98; Edwin MacFarlane, \$2,061.27; Colby Lewis, \$2,084.85; Allison Profit, \$1,940.95; Robert W. Hogg, \$1,890.51.

Mr. W. J. Reid on behalf of the V. E. Dunk River Calf Club accepted the Bank of Nova Scotia's yearly donation of \$25.00.

The meeting by unanimous vote expressed their appreciation of the valuable prizes received and asked the secretary to convey the thanks of the Company to the donors.

By a unanimous standing vote appreciation was extended to Messrs. C. M. Johnson and O. C. Johnson for their efficient work in putting up such a high quality of butter, and to Mr. John S. Wright, secretary and manager for the satisfactory manner in which he had conducted the year's business, and for his good salesmanship in procuring the best markets available.

Messrs. Edwin Lord and Scott Cairns were appointed delegates to the annual meeting of the P. E. I. Dairymen's Association, with Messrs. Walter Hogg and Cyril MacFarlane as alternates. They were authorized to give the Association assurance they would have the support of Dunk River Dairying Co., in the event of the operation of the cold storage plant being taken over by the Dairymen's Association. They were also instructed to sponsor a motion asking for cold storage facilities to be installed in the boat plying between here and Newfoundland.

Mr. Arnold Henderson was appointed delegate to the annual meeting of the P. E. I. Federation of Agriculture.

The meeting went on record approving the action of the Provincial Government in erecting a cold storage for dairy products.

Mr. Profit's Report

Mr. R. A. Profit gave an interesting and instructive address on the meetings he attended at Winnipeg and Calgary of the Dairy Farmers of Canada and the Federation of Agriculture. He made special mention of the items of business that were of particular interest to the dairymen here, and his report showed clearly that these organizations play a very important part in assuring the welfare of the industry. Strong representations are being made to the Federal Government for a higher support price for butter during the coming year, it being pointed out that higher prices for butter fat must be paid to the farmers if they are to be expected to keep their production up. It was also strongly recommended that a stiff duty be imposed on oils imported into Canada for use in synthetic butter substitutes.

Mr. Profit also gave a description of his visit to the Fraser Valley Milk Producers Association in British Columbia. This organization is a fine example of what can be done by combined effort on the part of the farmers. It has 3,700 patrons who provide an average of 200 pounds of milk per day. Its trucks pick up the milk throughout an area with a radius of 100 miles. The size and diversification of this plant is an example of the results of foresight and good management. The milk is utilized for butter, powdered milk, ice cream, and fluid milk. The equipment is of the most modern type throughout, and the success of this Association is a striking demonstration of the soundness of a policy which keeps abreast of the times. This two million dollar organization is controlled by a board of directors composed of seven farmers.

Mr. Profit congratulated the Dunk River Company on the steps that had been taken to make its equipment adequate for turning out its product to the best advantage and stated as his opinion that any who should fail to take such steps will find themselves outdistanced in the very near future. He thought that the great success of the Fraser Valley Milk Producers is a demonstration of what can be done to some degree, at least, by joint effort on the part of farmers in other localities. 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of Mr. Profit's address with hearty applause.

Dairy Superintendent

The president welcomed Mr. H. J. MacDonald, Dairy Superintendent of P. E. Island, and invited him to speak to the meeting.

Mr. MacDonald gave a very concise analysis of conditions with regard to butter, tracing the trends of production and consumption over the period since the competition of margarine had caused such a serious disturbance to the industry. He made his points very clear and his remarks reflected a sound logic in his appreciation of the situation. It had become evident during 1949 that steps must be taken if butter from this Province would not be handicapped on the various markets by the one-pound prints put up in the other Provinces. He felt that this Company's initiative in connection with this was to be commended and, from information available to him, it is quite apparent that it had paid off.

He summarized the reasons for the request made last year to the Provincial Government for the erection of a cold storage plant for dairy products exclusively, and gave a detailed description of the storage that had been built in Charlottetown. This storage is a great asset to the dairy industry in the Province as it assures suitable space at all times. He expressed the hope that all the creameries and cheese factories would stand behind the Dairymen's Association and make full use of the facilities that are at their disposal.
