The General Conference.

The General Conference of the Methodist Church meets to-day in Montreal. It is the great and only legislative body of the Methodist Church of Canada.

The representation to the general conference is, as the Halifax Herald explains, different from that to the annual conference.

The presiding officer of the general conference is a general superintendent elected for eight years. According to the present rules there must be two of those superintendents, but one office is now vacant through the death of the late Dr. Williams, and it will be a question discussed at the present session, whether one superintendent is not enough.

"It shall not revoke, alter or change any article of religion, nor establish any new standards or rules of doctrines contrary to our existing and established standards of doctrine. It shall not destroy the plan of our itinerant system. It shall not make any changes in the general rules of our society. It shall not do away with the privilege of our ministers and probationers for the ministry, or trial by a committee, and of an appeal; neither shall it do away with the privileges of our members of trial before the society, or by a committee, and of an appeal.

MRS. TRENHOLM'S LECTURE—A PLEA FOR THE SAILORS

Maritime Press Association.

Reports of Our Visitors.

The Halifax Herald has another long report upon the visit of the Maritime Press Association to this Province. It declares that "No party of visitors could desire to be treated with more courtesy and kindness than were the members of the Maritime Press Association by the press, Mr. Unsworth, superintendent of the P. E. Island railway, and the leading citizens of Charlottetown, Summerside and Souris."

The Herald summarizes Senator Howland's speech at the Press dinner. It reports that Senator Howland strongly advocated a union of the Maritime Provinces under one government. It was absurd for three small provinces to bear the enormous expense of three governors, three legislative assemblies, three legislative councils and three sets of department officers.

Those terms could only be carried out, he believed, by the construction of a subway. The scheme was feasible and was within the range of practical politics. The annual cost to Canada for interest would not exceed \$240,000 a year, a large proportion of which would be saved in the amount now paid for inefficient steam communication in winter and the deficit on the P. E. I. Railway. Indeed, he believed the subway would be a saving to the Dominion treasury. He looked to the maritime press to discuss this question, educate the people as to its merits, and keep it to the front until the problem is solved.
