These people talk of deficits but they budgeted for a deficit of \$15,000 in 1959 and wound up \$7 million in the hole, he criticized.

In five months they spent 72 percent of an \$18 million revenue and left \$5 million for us to carry on for six and one-half months, he said. And then when we complained because we got a bill for \$600,000 that should have been paid before they went out, they told us the bills came in the fall anyway.

"If that was correct what did they do with the 72 percent of the revenue," he asked.

"I don't hear much complaint about the Sales Tax, he said. "I think it's a good thing the Liberals left this province's sales tax where it is. It's a lapse and that we had to put the tax on."

He laid the blame directly on the former Liberal government for not insisting that the province get a bigger share than the 10 percent it received from the \$25 million, and later the \$35 million Atlantic Provinces Adjustment Grants. This adjustment had been suggested at a meeting of Civil Servants and there is no record that the Premier of this province ever entered any protest against the agreement, he charged.

"If we had got 20 percent or even 15 percent, instead of the 10 percent, we could have had a \$10 million surplus, he said. "If we had got the 30 percent that was promised in the 1958-59 formula had been established, our hands were tied when the provincial treasury was in a bind, he said.

"No government nor anyone else has made a mistake, he emphasized, and escape completely from losses.

PARLIAMENTS CLAIMED
