

**Designed To Aid
Private Stations**

WINNIPEG (CP) — Dr. Andrew Stewart, chairman of the Board of Broadcast Governors, says suspension of the 35 per cent Canadian content rule for television was designed to help private stations not yet financially "out of the woods" over the difficult summer months.

Dr. Stewart said here in an interview that "by fall they should be around the corner and be able to maintain the 35-per cent level easily."

The extra minute of advertising each half hour of sponsored Canadian shows will "hardly be noticed" by the audience, but will attract more sponsors to Canadian programs, Dr. Stewart said.

**Bank Savings
Show Increase**

OTTAWA (CP) — Savings on deposits in Canada's chartered banks at March 31 amounted to \$7,899,000,000, up from \$7,782,000,000 a month earlier and the \$7,494,000,000 total for March 31 1961.

The chartered bank statement for March also shows a \$1.4 billion increase in call and short loans in Canadian funds amounted to \$34,000,000 at March 31 compared with \$27,000,000 a month earlier and \$241,000,000 a year earlier.

**Practice Bombs
Found Off B.C.**

VICTORIA (CP) — Three United States Navy practice bombs have been found off this Vancouver Island city and U.S. Navy district headquarters has opened an investigation to find out how they got there.

A navy spokesman said the bombs were of the kind dropped by U.S. Navy Sky Warrior twin jet attack bombers which have been training over Juan de Fuca Strait.

The bombs were six feet long — simulating a nuclear weapon. They contain a small charge, so the pilot can check his accuracy.

**PROFESSOR'S FAT
MEANS DOLLARS**

BOSTON (AP) — A college professor's fat on the hoof proved to be worth more per pound Monday than prize-winning baby beef.

Just 14½ pounds of Prof. Haig der Marderostian will bring Emerson College \$16,000.

In six months the assistant professor of speech lost 116½ pounds, some 34 per cent of his total weight of 343½ pounds when he began dieting last Nov. 1.

When he began, Marderostian ruefully admitted he had lost sight of his shoes. Cheering the Needham professor in his drive to lose weight were college fund pledges ranging from a nickel to \$1 for every pound he would lose in six months. The offers came from fellow faculty members, alumni and students. They averaged up to about \$138 for every pound.

Instead of his elephantine tread of more than 400 pounds a ton last November, a relatively svelte six-foot Marderostian stopped on Boston City Hall official scales Monday with a light 228½-pound step. Some last April a graphic showed Marderostian's loss was indeed Emerson's gain, providing enough money to finance a new student union building.

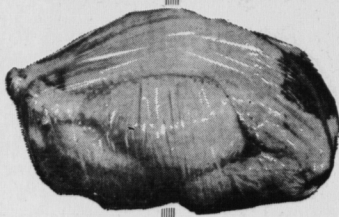

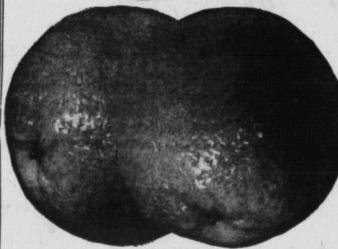
