Garbage Contract Award To Be Delayed 2 Weeks

Acceptance of a tender for collection of garbage in the city of Charlottetown will be postponed for approximately two weeks while the City Council decides if the contract should be a one-time weekly collection for all year or twice weekly collection for the summer months.

Although he thought council would award a twice weekly collection all year round, he had been informed by the city engineer that if twice weekly collection took place for only a three-month period in the summer, and a weekly collection for the remainder of the year, there would be a tremendous saving involved.

Tax On Credit Unions Seen Death Warrant

OTTAWA (CP) — If credit unions were subjected to income tax it would mean "signing their death warrants," the Royal Commission on Taxation was told Tuesday by J. O. Shippe, managing director of Credit Unions National Association.

Mr. Shippe, whose office is in Marlin, Wis., said any tax system so far proposed for credit unions "isn't elaborated on any of the proposals" would mean the organizations would go into rapid decline and ultimately die.

Prof. Barghoun Is Reaction To Arrest

MOSCOW (AP) — Professor Frederick Charles Barghoun, a Yale University Russian specialist who has been visiting the Soviet Union as a tourist, is under arrest on a charge of spying, the Russians announced Tuesday.

The Soviet news agency Tass said Barghoun, 52, the author of several books critical of the Soviet Union, was picked up by the KGB on charges of espionage by state security organs and an investigation is under way.

Loot Talled From Rifled Safety Boxes

MONTREAL (CP) — Thieves, taking advantage of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police's smashed through 40 feet of reinforced concrete in a bank vault and robbed 50 safety deposit boxes, police said Tuesday.

The total loot could reach "astronomical proportions," the police said, but will take days to check the bank's customers to determine the contents of the robbed boxes.
