Ceremony Sunday Recalls Battle Of Britain In 1940

A brief but impressive ceremony was held at Memorial Square, Summerside, yesterday afternoon commemorating the Battle of Britain. Upwards of three hundred airmen from R.C.A.F. Station Summerside led by the station band, and several hundred town residents gathered to pay homage to the valiant airmen who gave their lives in the 1940 air battle.

The program, which included the laying of wreaths and a three round volley fired by the honor guard, was held under bright sunny skies and brief addresses were made by His Worship Mayor W.A. Currie and O.H. Phillips, M.P. on the 17th anniversary of the stirring air battle in which many Canadian airmen serving with the R.A.F. lost their lives.

Following the ceremony at the square, a march past of R.C.A.F. personnel led by the R.C.A.F. band conducted by Bandmaster W.F. Conkey, took place in front of the Federal Building on Central Street, with Mayor Currie taking the salute. Also present at the saluting base were Group Captain W.H. Swetnam CD, DSO, DFC, commanding officer of R.C.A.F. Station Summerside, Dr. O.H. Phillips, M.P., E.F. Foley, M.L.A., Lieut. Roy Boates, officer commanding the Summerside area Cadet Corps and other dignitaries representing the various service clubs.

Early To Tell If Radiation Has Increased

TORONTO (CP) — A Canadian scientist said Wednesday it's too early to say whether radioactive fallout from nuclear explosions is upsetting the atmosphere's electrical balance.

P. D. McTaggart-Cowan, deputy director of Canada's meteorological service, said scientists must first find out whether an imbalance reported in Belgium is world-wide and whether it is caused by increased radioactivity from atom and hydrogen bomb tests.

He commented on newspaper reports, arising from the Belgium findings announced at an international meeting here, that radio communications may be blacked out and weather changed by radioactive action.

Mr. McTaggart-Cowan said in an interview the Belgian findings concern only a small region and could be affected by local conditions.

He said it was unlikely radio communication could be curtailed by such an atmospheric change since only certain long-range frequencies would be disrupted.

Also it would take a great buildup of radioactivity over a long period to cause such disruption and by then the change would be harmful to humans.
