

## Richard Scores As Habs Defeat Maple Leafs 3-1

TORONTO (CP)—Brilliant Maurice (Rocket) Richard scored one goal and set up another Wednesday night as Montreal Canadiens defeated Toronto Maple Leafs 3-1 in a National Hockey League contest before 13,480 fans.

The victory boosted Montreal's lead atop the standings to three points and left Toronto tied with Boston Bruins for fourth place.

The first period was scoreless and Richard started the Canadiens off at 8:08 of the second frame scoring on a breakaway. Sid Smith made it 1-1 near the end of the period when he caught the corner with a knee-high drive.

The Maple Leafs held a 23-14 edge in shots during the first two periods but the final frame was virtually all Montreal's.

### TALES SCORING LEAD

Richard was robbed by a fine stop by goalie Harry Lumley about the seven minute mark and Leclair picked up the puck and fired it back. The rebound went to linemate Dickie Moore and he tapped the puck across the goal line. Richard's assist gave him 12 points and the league's top scoring mark.

## American League Meets On Athletics Issue Today

NEW YORK (AP)—The American League meets today to try to decide—once and for all—whether the Athletics will stay in Philadelphia or move to Kansas City.

First business at the meeting, called for 10:30 a. m. at the Waldorf Astoria will be approval of an eight-man syndicate of Philadelphia businessmen as new owners of the A's.

The house of Mack, Connie and his two sons, Roy and Earle, have signed the papers for the transfer of their stock to the syndicate in a deal involving approximately \$4,000,000. The money is supposed to be in escrow.

Six of the eight clubs must approve a new owner. Any three can block approval.

It is not a certainty that the league will approve the new Philadelphia deal. If the eight-man syndicate is turned down it will be because of anti-Philadelphia sentiment among the other owners rather than anything objectionable about the individuals involved. If the league does not okay the new Philadelphia setup, the Macks obviously would have the club on their hands again. Whether they would turn to Arnold Johnson's \$3,375,000 offer involving moving the club to Kansas City, or try to

arrange yet another deal remains to be seen.

Will Harridge, league president, expects to finish the session in one day. The syndicate's deal with the Macks holds good only to 3 p. m. Friday.

Sale of the A's to somebody has been a sure thing since last summer when the club wobbled under the financial strain of a poor season both on the field and at the gate. Since before the world series, their status has been confused.

## Williams And Musial Close In Batting Race

NEW YORK (AP)—Ted Williams of the Boston Red Sox and Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals, a couple of baseball's all-time great hitters, are running one-two in the lifetime batting averages among major league players active during the 1954 campaign.

Williams, who hit .345 this season, kept his lifetime mark for 13 years at .348, tops among American Leaguers.

Musial, also a 13-year veteran, heads the active National Leaguers with a .344 average. The Cards slugger batted .330 in '54 and lost one point on his lifetime mark, statistics computed by The Associated Press show.
