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Former Alberton Minister Dies

WINDSOR, N. S., Jan. 2—(CP)—Rev. Percy A. Fitzpatrick, a past president of the Nova Scotia Temperance Federation, died in hospital here yesterday following a brief illness. He was 69. Pastor of the United Church here for five years, he later went to Alberton, P.E.I., and last summer transferred to Farraboro, N.S. He entered hospital here Dec. 16. Interment will be at Port Elgin, N. B., his hometown. Survivors include his widow, the former Helen Parker; two daughters, Marjorie, Mrs. Thomas Waddington, Montreal, and Florence, a student at the United Church Training School, Toronto; two sons, Lloyd, Halifax barrister, and Ralph of Saint John, N. B. Three sisters, two brothers and seven grandchildren also survive.

U. S. Urges More U. N. Members Aid In Korea

PARIS, Jan. 2—(CP)—The United States today urged that more United Nations members aid in the fight against aggression, particularly in Korea. Britain, Australia and Belgium voiced support for further U. N. collective measures against any aggression as proposed in a resolution put forward by 11 countries, including the United States and Canada. But Sweden said she could not take part in collective action which might involve her in a major war. The Swedish delegate, however, found no objection to the technical aspects of the collective measures committee report on which the resolution is based. Canada had a part in shaping that report which would permit the U.N. to ask regional pact forces, such as the North Atlantic Treaty armies, for help in event of aggression.

The Soviet delegate, Andrei Vishinsky, is expected to lose a blast at the Western Powers when the debate on collective measures, one of the items before the current General Assembly, comes up tomorrow.

Record Oil Discovery Year In Western Canada

EDMONTON, Jan. 2—(CP)—A record 108 oil and natural gas discoveries were made in Western Canada in 1951, industry sources reported today. Forty were oil strikes, 68 gas discoveries in new areas. More than 200 oil companies poured more than \$200,000,000 into western oil and gas exploration, development and land, these sources said. Alberta, heart of Canada's budding oil and gas industry, led the 1951 discovery parade with 98 finds, including 35 oil strikes and 63 gas discoveries. British Columbia had a gas strike, and its first oil strike, both in the northeast Fort St. John region. Saskatchewan came through with a pair of heavy oil strikes and three gas finds. A pair of discoveries in the southwest corner of Manitoba gave that province its first oil, but of non-commercial quantity. There were only 10 wildcat discoveries in Alberta in 1950. That year's 35 gas strikes was almost doubled by 1951 exploration. Best single discovery of 1951 was the Wizard Lake oil sector southwest of the Leduc field, which opened the West's new oil area in 1947. This sector, its oil reserves estimated at more than 100,000,000 barrels, is expected to receive major rating along with the Redwater, Leduc and Turner Valley fields. The industry sources estimated oil production for 1951 in the Prairie Provinces exceeded 47,725,000 barrels, an increase of more than 19,000,000 barrels over 1950. Alberta's output jumped to 46,470,000 barrels from 27,595,664. Saskatchewan produced an estimated 1,041,098 in 1950. Gross value of 1951 production to the producers was estimated at a record \$119,280,000, a \$5,000,000 increase in one year. Of this, Alberta accounted for about \$117,973,700, against \$82,207,697 the previous year.
