

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, July 23.

Mr. Surtos, City Engineer, is enquiring into the probable amount of available water power for the manufacture of electric light, in accordance with instructions from the City Council. The adoption by the city of the electric system is only a matter of time.

The by-law granting \$200,000 to the Canadian Pacific Railway passed the Winnipeg Council yesterday, the vote being 6 to 6, with the casting vote of the Mayor in favor of the measure. This a bonus offered by the city of Winnipeg as an inducement for the company to locate its workshops there, and make it the headquarters.

Sir Hector Langvin is expected to return to this city this evening.

Mr. Sydney Root, Commissioner of the Dominion of Canada for the International Cotton Exposition, Atlanta, Ga., is in the city introducing the aims and objects of the great exhibition to Canadians.

Lord A. P. Cecil, Lord Elphinstone, Col. Sir J. C. McNeil, K. C. B., Rev. Canon Taylor and Hon. F. X. Trudel, were among the passengers to England by the S. S. *Serapian* to-day.

"Le Concorde" says that in the Bellechasse contested election case a new proceeding will be commenced.

The capital stock of the Victoria Consolidated Silver Mining Company has been increased from \$128,000 to \$400,000.

MONTREAL, July 23.

The Lord Bishop of Quinoy, whose arrival in the city was noticed a few days ago, sprained his ankle while entering a car at Bonaventure Depot last night. The accident was not at first thought to be serious but after a few hours the pain became so intense that his Lordship had to leave the train at one of the way stations. He will probably be confined to bed for some weeks.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, July 24.

The News says: "Besides England, Austria and Holland have already signed (United States will be invited to participate in) a note to Russia in regard to her laws against the Jews."

FRETORIA, July 24.

There is a hitch in the Transvaal negotiations in consequence of the refusal of the Royal Commission to sit with the person appointed by the Boers as a member of the finance committee. The Boers have demanded an apology and refuse to meet the commissioner. Gen. Sir Evelyn Wood, replying to the deputations of the Loyalists, stated that special arrangements would be made, whereby the Boers will not be permitted to legislate for the natives without the consent of the British Resident. The murderers of Capt Elliott have been acquitted. The jury was composed of eight Dutchmen and one Englishman.

LONDON, July 23.

The Times announces that a proposal is on foot among the Liberal members of Parliament to appeal to Gladstone to consider the propriety of advising the Queen to discharge the "suspects" under the Coercion Act on the occasion of the royal assent being given to the Land Bill.

The News correspondent at Marv telegraphs on July 14: The Turcomans, in view of their reforms and suppression of brigandage, hope for European recognition of their nationality. I hope for speedy release. The Cornell University crew are still at Putney, but they will start for the Continent on Monday.

The race on the Danube is postponed till 11th of August.

It is stated that Bradlaugh has been advised that the payment of £200 and the execution of indemnity bonds by Charles Newdegate, Conservative M. P., the instigator of Bradlaugh's prosecution, to Clarke, a common informer, renders Newdegate liable to proceedings for maintenance, and that Bradlaugh intends to sue Newdegate for damages to cover the whole of the expenses to which he has been put. According to "Russell on Crimes," a person is guilty of maintenance who shall provide money or otherwise aid in the prosecution of a suit to which he is not personally a party.

WALLAWALLA, Washington Territory, July 23.

Engineer Reed, of the S. S. Knickerbocker, is under arrest in Brooklyn on the charge of causing the death of a fireman by cruelty, on the voyage from Havana last week. Reed denies the charge and is supported in his denial by the captain and surgeon.

The Sun says Conkling would say nothing last evening concerning the result of the contest, and declined to speak of his future intentions. A friend of his said: "Conkling might run for representative in Congress for Warner district. If he should be elected, he might be made Speaker of the next House." This story is not credited by many of Conkling's friends.

At the Stipendiary Magistrates Court, this forenoon, James Murphy appeared on complaint of Thomas Essery for house-breaking. He was remanded eight days. John Boyle, one of a half-dozen boys who broke into Mr. Phillips' house and stole a quantity of potatoes, meats, etc., was also remanded to jail for eight days to await examination.

A CORRESPONDENT, in a lengthy letter, complains of the manner in which the mails are distributed in the Charlottetown Post Office. He says that mails should be distributed within half an hour after arrival, but such cannot be done as long as only one or two clerks are compelled to do the work. He suggests that an arrival of a foreign mail clerks be set to work on its distribution:

FIRES—On Friday night last the barn of John Conway, Cornwall, Lot 32, was consumed by fire. There was in it at the time a horse, harness, farming implements, etc. The cause of fire unknown. The loss will be heavily felt by Mr. Conway, as he is a poor man. Last night about twelve o'clock a dwelling house and barn on Clyde River, Lot 31, were also consumed by fire. This property was lately in possession of Paul McPhail, but is now owned by Artemas Hyde. The neighbors gathered and had difficulty in saving the buildings of Mr. Hyde. There was no loss excepting buildings. This fire was undoubtedly the work of an incendiary, as no one has been living in the dwelling for two months and both buildings were in flames at the same time.

A FEW days ago we paid a visit to the "Seaside Hotel," owned by Mr. Newson. Within the last few years this has become one of the most popular summer resorts in the Dominion, and is largely patronized by American and Canadian tourists. The season has not yet fairly commenced, as the hot weather has been slow in arriving. At present there are about twenty five guests of distinguished Americans and Canadians, among whom we might mention Col. Cummings and wife of Iowa; Mr. and Mrs. Winthrop, of New York; Dr. and Mrs. Hendrick, Dr. and Mrs. McIntyre, Capt. Alexander, M. Ledlamme, Mrs. A. Swaby and family, and Mr. and Mrs. Sloggett, of Charlottetown. They appeared to enjoy themselves thoroughly, and "as birds in their little nests agree, they formed one happy family." On Monday morning, under the superintendence of Col. Cummings, ably assisted by our energetic townsman, Mr. Sloggett, Mr. Newson erected a telephone between the reading room and the bowling alley, where conversation can be carried on, and which adds very materially to the pleasure and enjoyment of the guests. Mrs. Newson, with an efficient staff, leaves nothing undone which can contribute to the comfort of visitors. Any person wishing a few days recreation, cannot do better than take a trip to the Seaside.

A Voluntary Confession.
