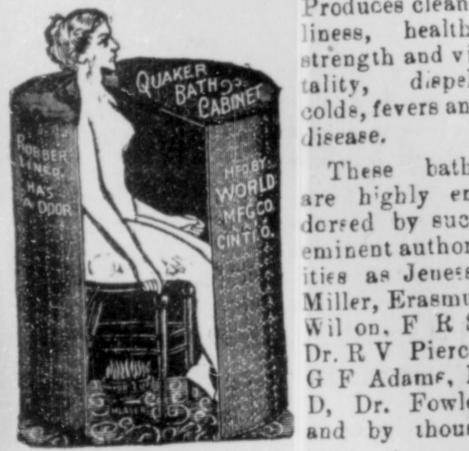

## THE ISLAND CONTINGENT.

the guests of the evening occupying seats to his right and left. After toasts to the Queen and President of the United States had been duly honored, God Save the Queen and the Star Spangled Banner having been sung, the President announced that Messrs Prowse Brothers had signified their intention of placing to the credit of Mr. H. Brown, of their establishment, half his usual salary during his absence; also that three volunteers from Souris—two of whom were officers who resigned their commissions to serve in the ranks—were to receive an advance donation of \$23 each from the citizens of Souris. He handed over the money in gold to each and great cheering. The next toast "Our guests—the Contingent" was drunk with all the honors. Major Weeks and Lieutenant Arthur Mellish—one of those who gave up their commissions as officers to serve as privates in the Canadian Contingent—responded feelingly and appropriately. Mr. March then sang in splendid voice "The Boys of the Old Brigade." "The Dominion of Canada "Our Own Canadian Home" brought up Lieutenant Governor McIntyre, Hon. Senator Ferguson and Hon. Fred de St. C. Brecken. Senator Ferguson laid stress, in the course of his capital speech, upon the solidarity of the British Empire, and the object lesson given to the world in the fact evidenced today, that if one part of the Empire is attacked all the other parts are ready to assist it. Mr. March then sang Rule Britannia, the whole company joining enthusiastically in the chorus. "The Provincial Government" was responded to by Premier Farquharson and Mr. Arthur Peters, Q. C., and "the City Corporation" by Mayor Warburton—who referred to the fact that Lieut. Hensley, a Charlottetown boy, was one of those engaged in the battle of Glencoe and subsequent engagements;—by Councillor Nicholson—who stated that three officers who took part in the great battle of Waterloo were natives of Charlottetown—and by Councillor (Captain) Hooper. Mr. A. E. Massie, of Fredericton, the well known tenor, then sang "the Queen of the Earth" and responded to a rapturous encore with "Sally in our Alley." The "toast to the Clergy" was responded to by the Rev. T. F. Fullerton, Rev. James Simpson, Rev. J. J. Teasdale, Rev. D. B. McLeod and the Rev. W. J. McConnell,—all with excellent and appropriate speeches. "The Army and Navy" brought up Lt. Colonel Moore, Lt. Colonel Dougherty and Lt. Colonel McLeod, of Huoter River; and the "Bench and Bar" Judge Fitzgerald and Mr. W. S. Stewart, Q. C., both of whom delivered eloquent patriotic addresses. "The unsuccessful volunteers"—those who had volunteered for service in the Transvaal and were not accepted—was proposed by Surgeon Major Warburton who remarked incidentally that none had been refused because they were physically unfit, and that those who had been accepted averaged 5 ft. 8 1/2 inches in height and a chest measurement of 37 1/2 inches. This toast was responded to by Capt. Moore, of No. 2 Company Artillery, and Mr. D. O'M. Reddin, both with capital after dinner speeches. Major Crockett gave his favorite recitation, "The Union Jack," with good effect. "The Press"—responded to by Messrs W. L. Cotton and Fred. J. Nash, "The Ladies," and "God Save the Queen" brought the banquet to a close. We congratulate the committee of management, Mrs. Davies, and all concerned upon the eminent success of their efforts.

The Island contingent will leave tomorrow morning en route to the Transvaal. They will be escorted to the railway station by the city militia with bands of music. The train will leave at half-past seven, local time. Extra cars will be placed on the regular train for the accommodation of the contingent and all who may wish to accompany them to Summerside. The incoming train from the west will be held at Summerside and the excursionists will return to Charlottetown by it, being due about 12 o'clock local. The return fare is only \$1. It is probable that the greater number of the militia officers and a good many other citizens will participate in the excursion.

Mr. Reg. Cox, a member of the Island contingent, was presented yesterday afternoon by his fellow employees of the Royal Electric Company, and Mr. James Waddell, Superintendent, with a handsome gold ring on which his name was artistically inscribed. Mr. Waddell also assured Mr. Cox that his position would remain open to him should he desire it when he returns.

Major Weeks, at the drill shed this morning, gave the men their first instruction in the drill of a company in attack. If time permits he will put them through the same movements at the park this afternoon.
