

Dr. And Mrs. Callbeck Return From Long Trip

—Dr. and Mrs. L. M. Callbeck have recently returned to their home in Summerside after a most enjoyable trip from Coast to Coast. Dr. Callbeck, a member of the Board of Governors of the Canadian Dental Association, attended the Golden Jubilee Convention, which was held in the Hotel Vancouver, Vancouver, B. C. Leaving Summerside by train they met a number of Italian officers who had completed their course and were returning home. They were most interesting companions. Travelling north the scenery through the Matapedia Valley was beautiful. En route they stopped over with friends in Toronto, also in Winnipeg, where they met Mrs. Harry Saul, the former Mary Sinclair of Summerside. At the next stop, Regina, the Queen City, they saw Miss Mildred MacMurdo of North Bedouque; Miss Addie MacMurdo and sister, Mrs. MacNeill, of Kelvin, Mr. and Mrs. James Townsend of Summerside, Mrs. G. A. Sutherland and daughter, Ethel, Mrs. Laura Hogg and sister, Mrs. Ross of Kensington.

In beautiful Banff, they spent a few days as guests of Mrs. Mathew, the former Grace Wright of Tryon. On the agenda here were many sight-seeing tours, which included Lake Louise, Sulphur Springs, and one of the most spectacular trips was to the Columbia Ice Fields which cover one hundred and fifty acres and belong to the Jasper National Park. They toured these by snowmobile and had luncheon at the Chalet. In crossing the Rocky Mountains the purring rivers and the towering mountains were unforgettable memories.

Ladies Entertained

The meeting and convention in Vancouver lasted for one week, so during the time the doctors attended them, a special program was arranged for their wives, who were royally entertained. Mrs. Callbeck was fortunate in seeing five of the palatial homes in British Possessions, as that particular time was the first they were ever opened to the public. One of the guides in speaking of the growth of Vancouver remarked that in 1886 the population was 2,000 and in 1952 it had increased to approximately 500,000.

A pleasant part of the journey was the boat sail to Victoria and to Seattle. From the latter city the travellers proceeded by bus on a special tour which took them through seven states. Following the coast line they crossed through Washington, traveled breath-taking hairpin turns through the redwoods of California, as far south as Long Beach.

The different stops included a visit to the orange groves of Buena Park; a drive through Hollywood, where the magnificent homes of the actors and actresses were pointed out; to Crescent City and San Francisco. In Los Angeles they met Mr. and Mrs. John Hall Lea, formerly of Tryon, and Mr. Colin MacNeill, son of Mr. Oliver MacNeill, recently of Summerside. One of the most outstanding sights here was the Forest Lawn Cemetery which houses Leonardo da Vinci's world-famous masterpiece, "The Last Supper," preserved in indestructible colors of stained glass, also America's largest Religious Painting, "The Crucifixion," by Jan Styka. They drove through Bakersfield which has been front page news, due to the recent earthquake.

Cross Desert

Continuing they crossed the desert, (Death Valley), stopping at Las Vegas and visited the famous Hoover Boulder Dam in Nevada; the Grand Canyon, one of the most wonderful natural objects in the world, in Arizona. In the beautiful Salt Lake City, they visited the Mormon Temple of granite and the Bingham Copper Mine, the greatest open pit copper mine in the world. The tour returned them to Seattle as they drove through the farm lands of Idaho, into Washington. The snowcapped peak of Mt. Rainier, with the sun shining upon it was beyond description.

Dr. and Mrs. Callbeck crossed the Rockies on return by way of the C. N. R. and viewed Mt. Robson, approximately 13,000 feet high. A stop over was made at Jasper Park before arriving at Edmonton where they visited the Devon LeDuc Oil Fields and on Sunday they attended service in the Presbyterian Church, where Rev. Edwin White, a former P. E. Islander, was the minister. In Calgary they received a contented series of thrills as they attended the Calgary Stampede. Some of the Islanders they con-

—Mr. John Riley returned to his home in Baltic, Lot 18, on Monday afternoon after a most enjoyable trip to High River, Alberta, where he was the guest of his cousins, the sons of the late Senator Daniel Riley.

On July 30, Mr. Riley left the province by automobile in the company of Dr. G. H. Farquharson, formerly of Charlottetown and now of Gleichen, Alberta, and Mrs. Farquharson. The first night was spent at Woodstock, N.B. The party stopped over in Annapolis, Ontario, where Mr. Riley spent a few days with his cousin, Mr. G. Levy, the former Margaret Riley. From Western Ontario, the motorists crossed into Minnesota and Wisconsin, then followed the main highway across North Dakota and into Montana as far as Sweet Grass, crossing at Coult on the Canadian side in Alberta. High River was the last stop.

Mr. Riley's hosts took him on many sight-seeing trips, which included beautiful Banff, the awe-inspiring Rocky Mountains, Edmonton, Calgary. In the latter city he met several native Islanders, as Mr. Frank Brazil of Summerside; Mrs. Hickey, the former Janie McDonald of Indian River; Mrs. John Riley, the former Dora Anderson of Darnley; Mr. Brent MacLeod of Kensington. On the return trip, Mr. Riley travelled by Greyhound bus. Crossing the prairies he was much impressed with the marvellous crops of wheat. At Winnipeg the bus took a southern route into the States and made stops at St. Paul and Minneapolis in Minnesota, Chicago in Illinois, and Detroit in Michigan, reentering Canada at Windsor, Ontario. A new bus route from Montreal went through Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine and was most scenic, comparing favorably with other scenery en route.
