THE WEALTHIEST IN THE WORLD.—The facts and figures gathered by the census and other means of a like nature will show this to be the wealthiest nation in the world, says a Washington despatch. Counting the railroads, shipping, lands, live stock, investments, houses and furnishings, and all representatives of wealth, the grand total of wealth is put down at \$50,000,000,000, while that of Great Britain is nearly \$10,000,000,000 less. The wealth per inhabitant in this country is, therefore, practically \$1,000 per head. In Great Britain it is a little above that.

The Route Through the Rockies.

Rev. Dr. Grant, principal of Queen's College, Kingston, who has just returned with Sandford Fleming from a trip through the Rocky Mountain route of the Canadian Pacific, reports Major Rogers in charge of the Rocky Mountain survey, having successfully achieved a triumph for a direct line. There are three distinct passes as follows: In the Rockies proper, Kicking Horse; in the Selkirk range, Roger's Pass, and in the Gold, or Columbia range, the Eagle pass. This virtually settles a long-disputed question, and gives the Canadian Pacific the shortest of all trans-continental railways. From Winnipeg to Port Moody on the Pacific is only 1,480 miles.

The Government Suit against the Bank of Montreal.

The following are the particulars of this case. In 1881 the Bank of Montreal which acted as the government bank, received from the treasury department a cheque for \$30,000 at that time had a Edward Island, which at that time had a running account with the Bank of Montreal, and acted as the latter's agents in the land. The cheque was accepted by the Bank of Montreal, and credited to the government account in that bank. The cheque was then forwarded to the Bank of Prince Edward Island, and this institution after holding it for two or three days charged it to the government account. A short time afterward the failure of the latter bank came, and the Bank of Montreal, to secure itself, reversed the former entry, and charged the Government with the \$30,000 lost by the failure. The government claims, however, that the bank is the responsible party and should bear the loss, and entered an action against the bank to recover the \$30,000.

LONDON, Oct. 15.

The counsel for O'Donnell will ask for postponement of the trial on the ground that essential witnesses for the defense have not yet arrived. Mr. Charles Russell, O'Donnell's leading counsel, is absent from England.

Chinese Troubles.

HONG KONG, Oct. 13.

Placards have been posted on the Island of Harban threatening the Mandarin foreigners with death. Naval protection is necessary. A serious riot has occurred at Toochoo. The renewal of rioting has been prevented by the French Consul.

Sir Stafford Northcote on Ireland.

LONDON, Oct. 15.

Sir Stafford Northcote closed the campaign in Ireland on Saturday, with a speech at Lorne (?). He said that, in order to develop her resources, Ireland needed order and repose. He deemed the Land Act beneficial. There should be no compact with national disturbers, who seek Home Rule through new measures for local government. He warned the Conservatives to guard against them.
