The Harlem Stars head for Summerside when they will take on a local team and if all goes as it did today at the recreational centre things won't be quite the same in Summerside for a little while.

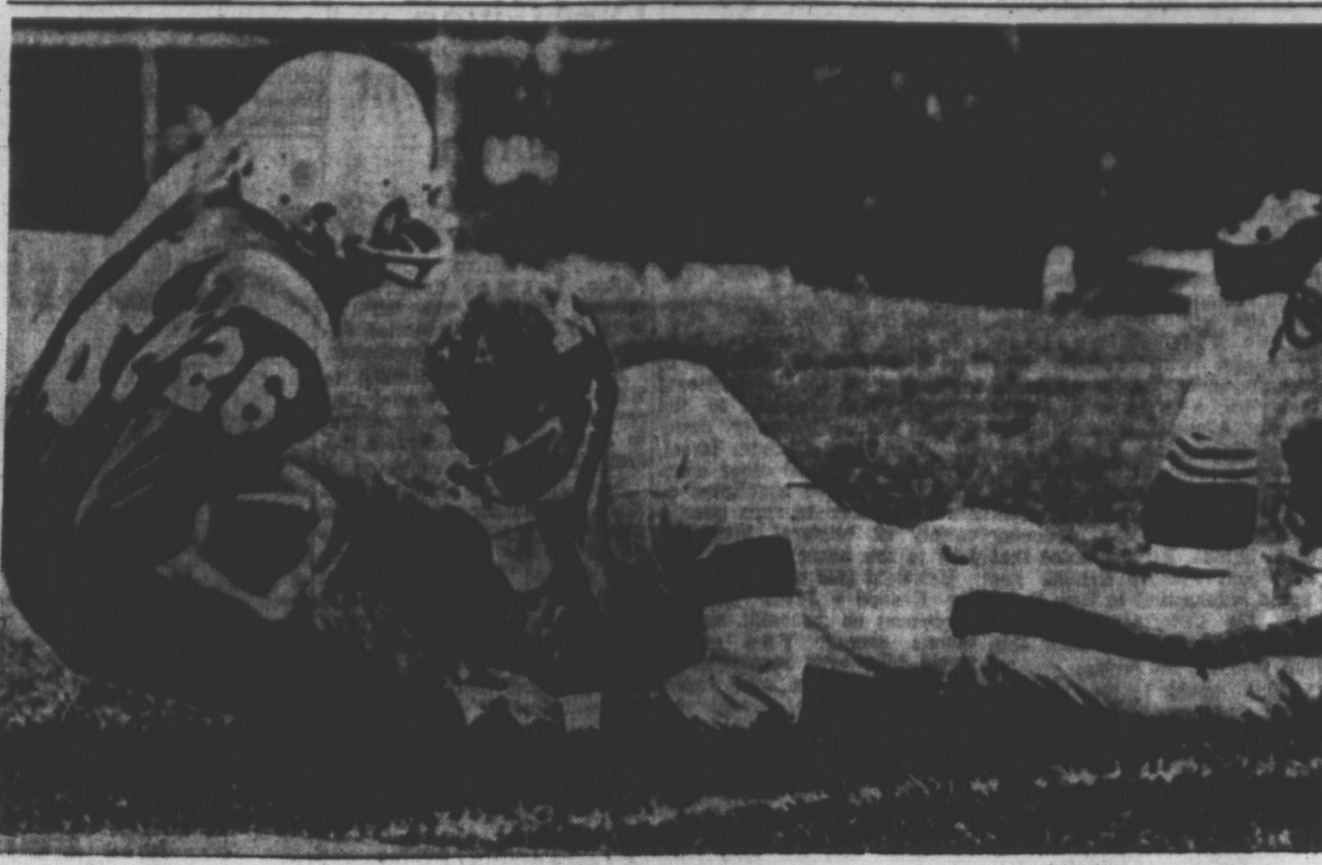
MARITIME RACING

NEW YORK (AP) — Montreal Canadiens capitalized on New York penalties for two quick goals in the third period and held off the Rangers 4-3 Sunday night for their second straight National Hockey League victory. Yvan Cournoyer snapped a 2-2 tie midway in the final period while the Stanley Cup champions enjoyed a two-man advantage. Less than two minutes later, with Montreal still in its power-play formation, Claude Provost fired what proved to be the winning goal.

The Rangers made it close on John McKenzie's tally with 30 seconds remaining and pressured Montreal goalie Gump Worsley in the final seconds but couldn't beat him for the equalizer.

Hamilton Tiger-Cats defeated Montreal Alouettes 6-3 in Montreal Saturday to take first place in the Eastern Football Conference for the fifth consecutive year.

A chilled crowd of less than 17,000 fans watched the Ticats pick up their ninth win in 13 tries. They picked up points on a single, a field goal and a safety touch.

In Ottawa Sunday John Villanus kicked his third goal of the game with 16 seconds remaining to give Toronto Argonauts a 17-15 victory over Rough Riders in the only other weekend EFC game.

A crowd of 13,487 saw Rough Riders take a 15-14 lead in the final minute of play on a single by punter Bill Cline.
