It is stated United States detectives discovered that the shippers of infernal machines from Boston were O'Donovan Reasa, Patrick Crowe and Peter H. Foye, the latter of Philadelphia. The machines were manufactured there. The entire affair was fraudulent and a plot to cheat the English Government out of a large sum of money, to be appropriated by its originator for their personal uses.

The Scott Act seems to be creating a stir. Three cases were up before the Stipendiary yesterday for remission in defiance of the statute, and we understand that about a dozen more are to be tried in a few days. Mr. Caldwell appears determined to push the matter vigorously and the right thinking part of the community will applaud him for so doing.—Pioneer

A COLD SWIM.—A seaman named Paddon, who shipped on board the brigantine Athol Cran, bound to P. E. Island, repented of his contract and wanted to be put ashore from the vessel, which was at anchor in the stream, yesterday afternoon. They declined to let him go and he jumped overboard and swam ashore. He was taken to the Sailors Home in a chilled condition and subsequently was headed over to the police as a deserter.—H. Herald.

AGUATIE.—A match race has been arranged by J. J. Davis, of the Rankin, and Mr. Schaff, of Halifax, for a race between the Charlottetown c-w and the Lavers-Hinch crew of Halifax, for one hundred dollars a side. The race will (weather permitting) take place to-morrow. There is a good deal of speculation in it, and the Charlottetown people intend to back their crew very heavily.

Mr. JOHN MURDOCH, who lectured in this city on Tuesday evening, and who, as he says, only gave some of the workings of land-jordism in the three kingdoms, lectures this evening the 13th, at Pownal; Friday, 14th, at Vernon River bridge; Saturday, 15th, at Belfast; Monday, 17th, at Metaguge Bridge; Tuesday, 18th, at Georgetown; and Wednesday, 19th, in Charlottetown again, when he engages to explain the tenure of land in the old country, and the solution of the question which he proposes.

At the meeting at the "Osborne House" last night the Regatta Committee and Mr. Disney, the referee, considered the protest made by the crews in the four-ared race. The protest made by the Lavers crew was withdrawn, but another was entered by the Charlottetown crew. It was to the effect that the Lovett crew took part in the race under a false name—that they raced under false pretences—being known in Halifax as the Williams' crew—they had changed their name to the Lovett crew for the race in Charlottetown. After considerable discussion the referee overruled the objection and decided the Lovett crew to be the winners of the race.

TEMPERANCE STARS.—Prince Edward Division No. 1, of this city, was, on last evening, honored by an official visit from the Rev. Charles Ladner, P. G. W. P., of Newfoundland, and D. Dogers, Esq., G. W. P., of P. E. Island. There were also present George Matheson, Esq., P. G. W. P., of Quebec, and brothers Wiswell and Offen, of Halifax. Mr. Ladner gave a very pleasing and graphic account of the temperance question in Newfoundland. By the influence principally of Catholic Societies and the sons, the temperance sentiment in Newfoundland stood very high. In many of the towns the liquor shops had been all closed up. He was glad to find Charlottetown, his native home, under prohibition. The contrast between that and the old license law was obvious. The other visitors followed in addresses of most practical and pleasing interest. Several of the Odes were rendered with a will. The closing service was conducted by the W. P. Mr. Polard, and the crowded division meeting dispersed.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

ELMIRA, N. Y., Oct. 11. In the regatta to-day the double scull race, 3 miles, was won by Courtney and Riley, with Ross and Burns second. Time 19 m. 48s.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11. In the Senate to-day the oath of office was administered to Senators elect, Clapham and Miller, of New York, and Aldrich, of Rhode Island. A petition from members of the New York Legislature, alleged certain reasons why Senators from that State are not entitled to seats, was presented and referred. The committee appointed to wait upon the President reported, having performed its duty, and that the President stated he would communicate in writing with the Senate to-morrow. The Senate then adjourned. It is stated that the final adjournment of the special session is possible in two or three days.

COLUMBUS, OHIO, Oct. 11. In the State election to-day, the indications are that Foster, Republican candidate for Governor will have 8,000 majority.

DES MOINES, IOWA, Oct. 11. Returns from State election to-day, not complete. The Republicans undoubtedly carry the State, but the majority is not known.

NEW YORK, Oct. 10. The Fourth Avenue carstables, owned by Vanderbilt, were burned to-night with a large number of horses. Loss \$200,000. The fire spread across 32nd Street, to Morrell's Furniture storage building which was entirely destroyed. A large amount of valuable furniture and other valuable property fell a prey to the flames, including pictures owned by Vanderbilt, valued at \$50,000. Total loss on the buildings and contents is estimated at \$2,000,000.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11. It is now stated that between 50 and 60 horses perished in the fire last evening. The Fourth Avenue stables were owned by Wm. H. Vanderbilt, and the estimated loss on them is \$200,000. The loss on Morrell's storage warehouse is roughly estimated at \$2,000,000. It is said that some of the finest furniture in the city was stored there and that a great portion of the most valuable kind, was owned by proprietors of the Fifth Avenue Hotel. A costly picture, valued at \$50,000, belonging to W. H. Vanderbilt, was burned. No insurance. The best families in the city, when travelling or out of town, deposited their valuables at Morrell's, and took their own risks insuring or not, as they saw fit. Hence much of the material stored was uninsured through neglect of the owners. A woman died from fright, and another woman was carried from the house in an unconscious state to the hospital.
