Temperance in Town.

Our esteemed contemporary, the Examiner, devotes a column and a half of its space in its issue of Monday to what purports to be a reply to a two-line item which appeared in the GUARDIAN of Saturday. As a matter of news the GUARDIAN stated that no arrests had been made for drunkenness for eight days. The free rum champion at once takes the statement as an admission that Charlottetown is more sober under free rum rule than when the Scott Act was in force. The conclusion is a very silly one. The fact that no arrests were made for eight days, or even a month, does not prove anything. The lack of arrests for drunkenness may be due to several causes. It may be, and we earnestly hope it is, that a general reform is setting in; but we are inclined to the belief that the manner in which the Stipendiary has been dispensing justice in this particular is having a salutary effect. Dull times may also have a great deal to do with it.

It costs money to buy rum and it takes money to pay a fine. The class generally arrested in this city for drunkenness are not

to anything verging on an idea in its favor. Under the guise of preaching a temperance sermon our contemporary very Jesuitically advances an argument in favor of free rum. Free rum and total abstinence do not travel together. Free rum means that saloons abound in every corner of the city; that all have access to them; that not only the confirmed drunkard secures all he can pay for, but the temptation is there for the young. Will the editor of our contemporary advocate the placing of a bar in the school which his boy attends? We think not. We think his desire is to place the curse as far away from his boy's observation as possible. What the country wants is prohibition pure and simple. That will come some day. In the meantime we want the next best thing—the Scott Act.

ORANGEMEN IN SESSION.

31st Annual Meeting of the Grand Lodge.

The 31st annual session of the Provincial Grand Orange Lodge of Prince Edward Island was convened in the Orange Hall, Charlottetown, on Tuesday last, Provincial Grand Master J. H. Bell in the chair. Deputy Grand Master Malcolm Matheson occupied the Deputy chair. The session opened in the Royal Scarlet degree, and after transaction of business pertaining thereto, the lodge reduced to the Orange degree. The various committees were appointed and ordered to report at the evening session.

In the afternoon an adjournment was made to allow the Scarlet Chapter to open for the initiation and advancement of seven candidates to that illustrious degree. The evening session was very largely attended. Besides the delegates present there were a large number of visitors.

The Grand Master's report was read. It contained a large amount of information concerning the order and good advice to the members generally. Grand Master Bell reports two new lodges organized in the province during the year; one at Victoria West and the other at Eldon. Those lodges started on very favorable circumstances and a bright future is expected for them.

The Grand Master gave a glowing account of his trips to Kingston to attend the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge and the Triennial Council. Feeling reference was made to the death of Bro. Allan Bethune, of 1154, who was a staunch Orangeman, a true friend and an affectionate husband and father.

The attention of the brethren was called to the P. E. Island hospital and a strong appeal made on behalf of that deserving institution.

The different lodges visited during the year were found to be in a flourishing state. The celebration of the 12th at O'Leary was a grand success.

Grand Secretary McLeod's report was also a very exhaustive one. Considerable progress was noted in the year's work.

Pointer for Advertisers.

Well-written advertisements are more than fifty cent news. Assertions can be made and sustained that there are cases on record where there has been more real brain matter expended on the making up of an advertisement than in the construction of many pages which rest under the dignified name, literature.—[South Bend Ind.] Tribune.

Never fix the price of anything so low that you can't afford to advertise it.

Circulars hit only once, if at all, and are then consigned to the waste-basket. Don't advertise spasmodically—keep it into a rut. Your particular line of goods may not be wanted to-day; they will be sought to-morrow, or the day after.

Don't run the same card from January to December. Change occasionally. Don't get into a rut. Have some vim. People won't and can't guess that you have a good thing.

Success means thought. It costs no more to publish good matter than poor. Prepare your matter carefully; make it attractive; don't crowd; let your catch lines be bold.

Great fortunes made by advertising Napoleons are often referred to. But who has counted the moderate fortunes, the comfortable competencies, and the steady sources of income that are to be credited to newspaper advertising? To dispense with advertising would dry up commerce and turn back civilization.
