

# Nomads Clobber Windsor To Win Football Ch'ship

The Charlottetown Nomads powered by their machine rolled to the Nova Scotia-Prince Edward Island Senior Rugby League Championship here on Saturday afternoon as they crushed a spirited Windsor team 23-2 in a game on the Queen Charlotte High School field.

The Nomads were held off the score sheet for twenty minutes on Saturday by a stubborn Windsor defense that simply would not break. But at the twenty minute mark team captain Jack "Sp" Ready scored on a penalty kick and the Nomads were on their way.

They scored eight more points during the first half to make the score 10-0. Three Nomad tries and two penalty kicks during the second half ran the count to 23. The visitors got their only points of the game at the 26 minute mark of the second half when Alan Haley scored on a penalty kick.

The win was the fourth in League play for the Nomads against one of the best another game by default from Truro when the Bears

cats were unable to play two weeks ago and could not muster a team for a replay.

The Nomads will meet the Acadia University Intermediates next Saturday for the Maritime Senior Championship. Site of the game has not yet been decided upon.

In Saturday's game both clubs threw up a rugged defense at the outset with the result that much of the play ranged around centerfield. Gradually the Nomads worked into Windsor territory and on one occasion George Kelly almost hit pay-dirt but he was hauled down by the veteran Windsor forward Burdette.

After Jack Ready put the Nomads ahead 2-0 with a penalty kick at the twenty minute mark the Nomads came charging back and five minutes later flying quarter Freddy Driscoll crossed the line between the posts.

The score followed from a scrum on the Windsor 15 yard line. The ball came out to Dave Nicholson who relayed to Driscoll on the run instead of passing Driscoll elected

to run the ball and his move caught the Windsor defenders flat-footed. The sure fingered flying quarter cut inside and raced over unmolested to make the count 5-0.

The Nomads started their march to Windsor line again as soon as they took the kick-off from center field. Big Dave MacLeod raced down the sidelines and passed to Ronnie McIvor. McIvor took the ball on the run and passed to Claude Fields.

Fields eluded one would-be tackler and streaked for the goal line with only the fullback to beat. He raced around the lone defender across the line and down behind the goal posts for the first try of his career. Jack Ready made the convert to put the Nomads ahead 10-0.

In the second half the Nomads kept hammering at the Windsor line and big Joe Coyle came close as he plunged five yards before being stopped. On the next play the ball wheeled out to the Nomads halfline and Dick Carroll scored

after taking a pass from Clee Gillis and running across the line with two Windsor tacklers on his back. Although being outscored the Windsor team were not outplayed by such a margin as the score would indicate. They fought stubbornly throughout and on numerous occasions lead dangerous thrusts into Nomad territory.

Several times they kept the Nomads hemmed inside their 25 yard line. Once Sabian the classy Windsor flying quarter broke through only to be hauled down by fullback Jack Ready about five yards from the line.

Finally Windsor connected on a penalty kick with Alan Haley splitting the uprights 26 minutes after the second half had started.

The Nomads scored two more tries to complete the events of the afternoon. At the thirty minute mark rugged Dave Nicholson streaked through a maze of Windsor tacklers to score and Jack Ready converted to make the count 18-2.

Two minutes later Dave MacLeod pulled off a 40 yard run down the sidelines. He took a pass from Dick Carroll following a halfline play and eluded about five Windsor tacklers in his brilliant run. Ready made the convert to complete scoring matters.

The game was handled by Cy MacIsaac.

Beliveau's tally was his fifth in two nights against the Bruins and was hotly disputed by Boston goalie Terry Sawchuk who argued that the Montreal forward was in the crease.

ACCIDENTAL TALLY

The Bruins had forged into a 3-2 lead in the final period on goals by Leo Labine and Doug Mohns. The latter received credit for the marker when his drive was knocked accidentally into the goal by Montreal defenceman Tom Johnson.

Boston completely outplayed the Canadiens in the opening period but could only score once. Murray Costello accounted for the tally when he tipped in a 15-foot drive by Orval Tessier.

The Canadiens bounced back in the middle session and went ahead on goals by veteran Maurice Richard and rookie Claude

Provost. The goal was Provost's first in the NHL.

The Bruins dominated the play in both the first and third periods but were stymied time and again by Montreal goalie Jacques Plante, who totalled 31 saves.

Provost's goal came on a 75-foot slap shot which sailed past two Boston defenders and caught the lower corner as Sawchuk looked on in amazement. The young winger was recalled last week from Shawinigan Falls and happily grabbed the puck as a souvenir.
