## Safety Officials Meet In City Visit Yesterday

The paths of two officials concerned with aquatics crossed on the island yesterday. A. W. Thiessen, BPE, Toronto national director of the Red Cross Water Safety Service was visiting the island on part of his cross-Canada tour to become acquainted with provincial directors of Red Cross and the situations facing them.

Brig P de C. Jones, CBE, London, England, chief secretary of the Commonwealth Council of the Royal Life Saving Society was here in the interest of arranging the agenda for the Commonwealth conference of the society to take place in London next year.

The Red Cross and the Royal Life Saving Society, the two men explained, are almost under the same roof on the island. This they noted as an important factor as in some parts of Canada the co-operation between the two is nil.

They stated that every child ought to learn to swim and to learn to help others who may be in difficulty.

**TEN METHODS**  
The Red Cross teaches great numbers of Canadian children to swim every summer. The life saving methods are then taught by the Royal Life Saving Society.

The Society was founded 75 years ago, with the purpose of

preventing drownings, by William Henry. In 1947, Canada got a council of its own which became self governing in 1960. The Prince Edward Island branch was established in 1963. The president of the island branch is Rev. O.C. Sharkey, who was one of the first island group to receive an award from the Red Cross society.

The society has four main national branches in United Kingdom, Australia, Canada and New Zealand.

The two men plan on taking a look at the role each organization can best play in life saving.

**DROWNING RATE UP**  
They explained that more people than ever are near the water, therefore the drowning rate is going up and the need for better training and training more people is increasing.

Father Sharkey said that over 100 Red Cross instructors were active on the island this summer. In the National Park 15 life guards were on full time duty. He stated that in the last 20 years there has never been a fatality in a supervised area but supervisors are now needed where they once were not, as more people frequent the beach than ever before and go to beaches which were once not so popular.

## Red Cross Clinic Tops Objective

A total of 310 blood donors attended yesterday's final sessions of this week's series of Red Cross clinics at the Confederation Centre in Charlottetown. There were 125 in the afternoon, and 185 in the evening, 40 in excess of the day's objective of 270.

Fremont Archer, chairman of the Red Cross blood donor committee for Charlottetown, announced last night that the overall total for the four days of clinics was 1,238 on the objective of 1,140—or a 108% result.

Mr. Archer expressed gratification at the excellent response and extended sincere thanks to all the donors, volunteers and all those who in any way were responsible for this outstanding achievement. He commented on the excellent facilities provided for the clinic at Confederation Centre, and stated that the four day clinic, instead of three, had proved to be much more satisfactory for both the donors and workers.

Volunteers who carried out various tasks in connection with yesterday's clinics included representatives of Trinity United Church Women, St. Pius X C.W.L., The University Women's Club, as well as local nurses and members of Queen Charlotte and Birchwood High School Red Cross Councils.

The only competition result which could be determined last night was that conducted between the girls and the boys at Prince of Wales College with the girls edging out the boys by the small margin of four. Winners of the trophies in eight other competitions will be announced at an early date.

F. A. S. Jones, provincial chairman of the Red Cross blood donor committee stated last night that the fifth and last series of clinics for 1965 will be held December 6, 7, 8 and 9 at Summerside, the R.C.A.F. Station, Kensington, Borden and St. Peter's Bay.

Mr. Jones extended congratulations to the donors who attended this week's clinics in Charlottetown, as well as to the local committee on the success of the series.

## Summerside Council Appoints Committees

**SUMMERSIDE** — A special Town Council meeting was held here early last evening for the purpose of dealing with a number of resolutions, which the council wished to clear up immediately rather than hold off until the next regular meeting Oct. 18.

Another reason for the meeting was to elect committees as a result of the by-election earlier this week to fill the vacant centre ward seat. At that time Milton G. Mellich won the seat by acclamation.

Five resolutions, either awarding or calling for tenders, were put before the council.

The firm of Fitzgerald and Snow of Summerside with a bid of \$1,880 was awarded the tender for the construction of two pump pits. These pits are to be

built at the town's numbers three and four wells and will be insulated to keep out frost and dirt.

**FUEL TENDER**  
The tender of the Canadian Oil Company for the supplying of approximately 120,000 gallons of furnace fuel oil for the boilers in all civic buildings along with free burner service was accepted over five other tenders.

Tenders for the demolition of the buildings and removal of all debris from the property at 16 Granville Street were received and the bid entered by Emmett Kelly of \$490.25 was accepted.

The town recently bought this property to enable it to widen First Street at the intersection of First and Granville. The Kelly of \$490.25 was accepted.

The reason for the two-way tender, the council was told, is that the truck now being used by the electric department might be retained and used by some other department.

## Prominent City Woman Dies Thursday At Home

Mrs. C. St. Clair Trainor, the former Bernadette MacMillan, R.N., and wife of Judge Trainor, died at her home in Charlottetown yesterday.

A native of this city, she was a daughter of the late Sir (Dr.) William J. P. MacMillan, one-time Premier and long time Leader of the Opposition in the Provincial Legislature.

Mrs. Trainor was a graduate of the Charlottetown Hospital School of Nursing in the class of 1933 and had practised her profession both here and in Massachusetts prior to her marriage. She had been in ill health for the past two years and only this week had returned with her husband from Montreal where she had gone last week for treatment.

Until she became ill she was president of the Catholic Women's League of Holy Redeemer Parish and past president of St. Veronica's Guild Nursing Association. She had also devoted a great deal of her time and efforts to aiding the work of the White Cross Association.

She is survived by her husband and three children, a daughter Elaine, doing social work with the Family Service Association of Toronto, and two sons, Charles, a first year medical student at Dalhousie University, and Leo, a student at St. Dunstan's University.

Also surviving are two sisters, Dorothea (Mrs. M. A. Farmer), Charlottetown, and Nora (Mrs. George E. Bohan), Burlingame, California, and three brothers, Dr. Alan H.
