MARKET HALL.—At the City Council meeting last night His Worship Mayor Haviland suggested that it would be well if the Market Hall were not let for bazars, etc., on the evenings previous to market days, as it was generally left, after such occupancy, in a condition the reverse of clean, greatly to the discomfort of those having to buy and sell there. The suggestion is under the consideration of the Market Committee.

THE HEALEY CASE.—John Healey, who was before the Supreme Court last week, upon habeas corpus, and who was committed to jail by Messrs. Heard and Mellish, was today brought before Chief Justice Sullivan and Judge Peters on another writ of habeas corpus. The case assumed a different complexion, and appeared to be more complicated than on the former application. After argument by Mr. Hodgson, Q. C., for the prisoner, and Mr. Stewart for the convicting magistrates, the Chief Justice and Judge Peters held the prisoner's imprisonment to be illegal, and ordered his discharge. He was accordingly released by the jailor, who was present.

S. E. B. C.—The adjourned annual meeting of the South End Boating Club was held last evening at their rooms, Lower Water Street. By the report of the Auditing Committee, appointed at the annual meeting, it was shown that the Club was in an excellent position financially. Seven new members were balloted for and elected unanimously. The Secretary's report of last year's business was very satisfactory. It is clear that the S. E. B. C. has become a power in aquatic circles here, and there is no doubt but that this Club, which is now verging on its sixth year, will do the Island credit if it only receives the encouragement due to such an institution. A committee has been appointed to draft a new constitution for the Club, with the object of applying for incorporation at the next session of the Legislature. The next meeting will be held the first Monday in June.

JUBILEE SINGERS.—The mud and rain only prevented the Windsor Hall from being uncomfortably crowded Tuesday night, for it was well filled by a large audience, characterized by an inclination to encore everything. A company, comprising some of the original and famous "Fisk Jubilee Singers," gave a concert of plantation melody to the delight of all. Of the new selections the typical chorus "Jonah and the whale" was convulsive. The voices are all of good quality, but that of Mr. J. H. Chavers was a revelation to the majority, who were wender-struck that any human being could create such an extraordinary and melodious rumble of sound. In the intermission the discussion became general and animated whether his voice was most like the bottom notes of a cello or a fog horn. All agreed that his efforts were prodigious. Miss Gilliam added variety by recitations, given with elocutionary skill, the first describing the horror of a young negro girl when she discovered that her good-natured but pleasure-loving master had lost her at the gaming table. Her suicide from the deck of a New Orleans steamer was a thrilling episode.—Montreal Daily Witness, March 13.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, May 12.

The first business of the House to-day was to adopt unanimously the report of the privileges and elections committee on the Rykert affair. This was done without discussion, except for a few words.

The report of the special committee on the Bremner furs was next considered, on motion of Chairman McNeill for its adoption.

Mr. Blake made a bitter attack on Gen. Middleton, and expressed the hope that as he had received honors and rewards for his services in the rebellion, he should pay for his misconduct now by being compelled to make good Bremner's loss, and also by withdrawing from the Dominion service.

Sir Adolphe Caron, without defending the General, asked the House to consider the extenuating circumstances connected with this most unfortunate misconception on Middleton's part. He announced that the General had expressed his willingness to indemnify Bremner for the one-eighth of the furs appropriated by Middleton's orders.

Mr. Lister followed up Blake's attack, and held that the General should pay the total loss, as, but for his denials, the Government would have investigated the matter years ago.

Sir John Macdonald thought the House should not too severely condemn the want of judgment shown in the confiscation, as they should remember that there had been a good deal of confiscation in the China and Indian service, in which Middleton had been engaged; but he thought, nevertheless, that the General had acted quite illegally in confiscating the furs and in appropriating them. He had committed an illegal and improper act for which there could be no defence.

In answer to Mr. Mitchell, who called upon the Government to state what they were going to do with the General now, Sir John Macdonald said the Government could take no action until the report was passed upon by the Commons. When that was done, it would be the duty of the Government to consider what further action should be taken.

The report was adopted after some further discussion of an unimportant nature. After recess, the House sat in committee until one o'clock.

The bill amending the Railway Act (from the Senate) was considered in committee and adopted.

The House adjourned at 1.45.

German Colonization.

BERLIN, May 12.

In the course of the debate on the estimates for expenses of the Colonies in the Reichstag, Gen. Von Caprivi, Imperial Chancellor, stated that though he originally warmly approved the Colonial policy of the Empire, he agreed with Prince Bismarck that such a policy could only be maintained with the support of the Nation. As the matter now stands the Government cannot retreat from its position in regard to Colonial affairs without losing honor and money. No change in his views or system was to be in any way implied from his assumption of office. The Government would everywhere respect foreign right and protect German rights.

Died of Consumption.

FREDERICTON, N. B., May 12.

The many friends of Rev. Howard Sprague, D. D., will regret to hear of the death of his eldest son Henry, a young man of 20 years of age. Deceased has been ill for several months at his father's residence at Marysville. The cause of his death was consumption.

Important Adhesion.

MONTREAL, May 12.

The Conservatives are jubilant over the late adhesion of Ex-Premier Debocheville to their ranks, although he has up to the present been disposed to give Mercier an independent support.

Strike at Pittsburg.

PITTSBURG, Pa., May 12.

Three thousand employes of the National Tube Works Co., McKeesport, went on strike this morning, for ten per cent. increase of wages.
