THE FIRST SOD.

THE turning of the first sod of the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway was a notable event. After a quarter of a century of agitation and expectancy, more or less pronounced, we have at last seen the beginning of the work, and the first practical step towards the undoing of the mistake committed thirty years ago, when the electors of Belfast, under the influence of wrong representation, voted to "abolish the railway from Prince Edward Island." The occasion was duly and properly marked by the presence of the Lieutenant-Governor and Mrs. McIntyre, the Misses McIntyre, Mrs. Rogers and other ladies, as well as the members of the Government and Legislature and a large number of persons from town and country. Under the superintendence of Mr. Sharp, the arrangements were well carried out. There was first a salute of thirteen guns in honor of the Lieutenant-Governor, admirably given under direction of Major Hodgson, then a short speech by the Superintendent and the formal turning of the sod by Mrs. McIntyre, followed by the blowing of all the railway whistles in the city, and then very short congratulatory speeches by the Lieutenant-Governor, Mr. McManus, Premier Farquharson, Mayor Warburton, Attorney-General McKinnon and Speaker Cumiskey,—then there was a rush for the ferry.

While the occasion was one for felicitation, it is to be regretted that but eleven and a half miles of the line have yet been "located" and put under contract, and that there is, so far, notwithstanding our wayfarer's acquiescence in its out of the way site, no sign of the promised bridge. The whole line should be constructed at once and in a business-like way, and not involved with election contests in the near future, or made a means of bribery and corruption by the party in power. Why has the engineer not gone on to locate the line? Why has the superintendent been instructed to proceed with the award of land damages? Why does the Minister of Railways hesitate to sign the agreement with the Provincial Government respecting the bridge? Why so long in calling for tenders for bridge construction? There are questions asked by a very much interested people. We hope that Senator Ferguson and Messrs Martin and McDonald or other members of the Liberal-Conservative party will have no further trouble about the matter. The Liberals have now a good opportunity to raise themselves in the estimation of the people by carrying on the work of railway construction in this Province in a business-like way.

DEBATE ON THE ADDRESS

THE debate on the Address, concluded last night, brought out several excellent speeches on the part of the Leader of the Opposition and his twelve supporters. At the beginning, the Government and its supporters were disposed to wander abroad into Dominion and Imperial fields,—perhaps to divert attention away from the Provincial field, their present mismanagement of which is so apparent! Thither the Opposition speakers followed them with superior debating ability as well as with the essential element of truth. As will be seen by those who may read the report of Mr. Shaw's speech, published in another column of THE EXAMINER, they were completely floored in respect to their contention about the sending of the First Canadian Contingent, while Mr. DesRoches and others caused them to regret that they raised the race cry in this Province. Though Mr. Campbell's speech covered too much ground to be as fully effective as it would have been if he had devoted his attention to one or two points, it was nevertheless a powerful arraignment of the Government and left them with scarce a leg to stand upon. Mr. Murdoch McKinnon delivered a particularly neat and forcible speech, and Mr. Prowse's maiden effort gave evidence of the same pungent quality which made his respected father a terror to evil-doers in the politics of the Province. The McDonalds were also in evidence, Mr. J. A. McDonald delivering a short but able and practical address. It was remarked by Mr. Prowse that the Government has not now a single McDonald on its side of the House, that one of the Rogers is gone, that McKinnon is out of it, that Mr. Wise—to whom Mr. Farquharson owes the position of Premier—has withdrawn his support, all evidencing the fact that the Government has lost the confidence of the people. Mr. Birch delivered a capital address, scoring heavily with reference to the trade question and the marked increase in the cost of imported articles. Towards the close of the debate, Mr. A. A. McLean spoke at length and very ably, dealing in a masterly manner with the question of the Fishery award and administering heavy blows to Mr. Farquharson and his followers. His characterization of "Pineau Government" will probably live in history. It is to be noted that Mr. Pineau said never a word but steadily voted with the Government which a short time ago, he was elected to oppose.

We have never seen the leader of the Opposition more fully alive to the demands of his important position or keener in debate than he is this session. He realizes the description of the man who becomes brighter as he grows older.
