Our Paper has been unavoidably delayed until this day (Tuesday.) No Mail had arrived during the past week, indeed the weather for some days past has been so exceedingly cold and boisterous as to prevent travelling in a great measure. On the night of Saturday last, and early on Sunday morning, we are informed that the thermometer averaged thirty-two degrees below Zero. Yesterday (Monday) the snow and drift was so severe, that access to each others dwelling was attended with the utmost difficulty, owing to the huge white mountains in every direction. This day we have quite an agreeable change, and the inhabitants are seen in every direction clearing away the obstruction that yesterday so effectually sealed the entrance to their habitations. We observe by an article in the *Mirramichi Gleaner* of the 22nd ult., 35 degrees below Zero was the average there at that date, the paragraph further asserts: "As far as the season has advanced, it has been the most severe one experienced for many years." Nearly the whole of this week's impression is taken up by correspondents whose claims upon the columns of this paper shall at all times take precedence.
