That Body Of Yours

TUBERCULOSIS HAS NOT BEEN CONQUERED

When Drs. Banting and Best discovered insulin and the lives of diabetic children were being saved, many of us thought that a cure for diabetes had been discovered and there would be no more deaths. The truth of the matter is that with the discovery of insulin, there need be no more deaths from diabetes if treatment by diet and insulin is followed intelligently.

Of course, there are just as many cases of diabetes as before insulin was discovered and also many deaths because diabetes is as prevalent as ever, new cases developing constantly. However, insulin can control diabetes and allows the diabetic to live a full or complete life.

A few years ago a number of sanatoriums for tuberculosis were closed down for lack of patients and perhaps many of us thought that tuberculosis was stamped out from our midst. However, while it is true that new drugs, particularly streptomycin, kill T. B. germs, there are some germs that build up a resistance against these new "wonder" drugs and the treatment by rest in a sanatorium becomes necessary.

From the Bureau of Public Information, Duke University, Durham, N. C., Earl W. Porter, Director, we learn: "Despite medicine's giant steps in the right direction, tuberculosis has not been conquered. The public has not been impressed, because of the new wonder drugs, that T. B. can be cured 'as simply, cheaply, and efficiently as pneumonia,'" says Dr. David T. Smith, professor of bacteriology at Duke University Medical School. Nothing can be further from the truth. These patients still require long periods of sanatorium treatment.

Unfortunately, because streptomycin was called the wonder drug for tuberculosis, tubercular patients refused medical advice for hospital or sanatorium care and insisted on home injections. While these new drugs have definite advantages, as they kill most tubercle bacilli, they work better with other drugs and, as stated above, they fail to kill these T. B. organisms in some cases.

"People think T. B. has been conquered because figures show — and truthfully so — a great reduction in the death rates from T. B. However, there has not been an accompanying decrease in the rate of newly diagnosed cases." The new drugs cannot be used until the cause of T. B. has been discovered. With all of our modern discoveries, new cases of T. B. will continue to appear.

As with other things in life, then, "eternal vigilance is the price of safety" and all should take advantage of free chest surveys, as T. B. discovered early can be controlled and cured.

Tooth Powder

To make a good tooth powder use 4 ounces of precipitated chalk, 1 ounce of powdered myrrh, 2 ounces of pulverized borax, and 1 ounce of powdered orris, mixing it through a fine bolting cloth.

Save Ravelings

Paint Brushes

How Can I ...

Q. How can I remove gloss from woollens?

A. Wring a piece of cheesecloth out of water containing a few drops of ammonia and sponge the fabric thoroughly with long, straight sweeps of the arm. Press under a damp cloth.

Q. How can I disguise the taste of castor oil?

A. First put a small amount of orange juice into the glass, then the oil; add more orange juice, and finish by stirring in a pinch of soda. Drink while it is effervescing.

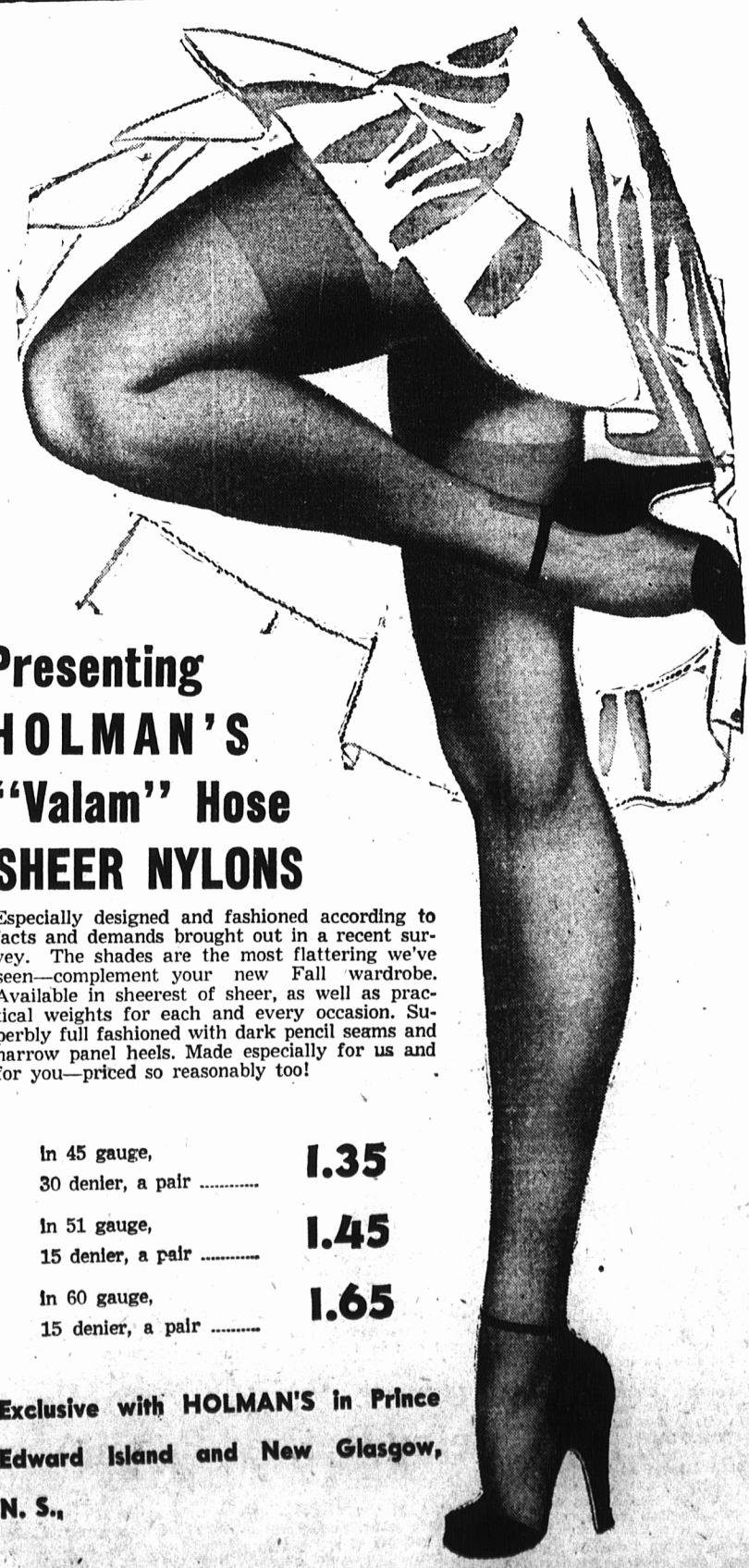

Cook's Corner

HADDOCK IN CREAM

One and one-half pound fillet of haddock, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 teaspoon prepared mustard, 1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 3 small onions, 1 cup cream, parsley, paprika.

Wipe haddock with damp cloth and place in baking dish. Mix lemon juice, mustard, Worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper, together and pour over the haddock. Add onions and cream. Bake in a hot oven, 400 degrees F., about 30 minutes. Garnish with parsley and sprinkle with paprika.
