A New York lawyer named Cowles fell from the train while en route from Montreal to Quebec a few nights ago. The body has not yet been found.

Last week a carpenter named Geo. McConnell fell off the roof of a house, on which he was working, at the south end of the town of Yarmouth, N. S., on the afternoon of the 12th, he died from the effects of his injury.
