Notes and Comments.

The St. John Telegraph says:— "Vacancy, vacancy, all is vacancy. Vacancy in the morning, vacancy at noon, vacancy at night; vacancy for breakfast, for lunch and for dinner; vacancies hot and vacancies cold—vacancies even nine weeks old."

This reads as if there were a "vacancy" in the upper story of the man who wrote it.

Some idea has been formed by an exchange of the vast quantity of water discharged by South Fork Lake into the Conomah Valley when compared to the flow over Niagara Falls. Estimating the Niagara supply at 33,000,000 tons of 36 cubic feet per hour, and taking the measurement of the lake to have been 34 miles long by 1 1/2 miles wide, with a mean depth of 30 feet, we have the enormous volume of 1,000,000,000,000 of tons of water, which would require 30 hours in passing over Niagara Falls.

Senator Hoar has arrived at Worcester, Mass., after a western trip with the Senate committee on "Trade Relations with Canada." In the course of an interview he is reported to have said: "The impression that the fortifications at Esquimaux, Vancouver Island were a menace to the United States, was unfounded. The island has not the natural advantages necessary to make it under any circumstances a formidable fortification. He is also satisfied that the ties of affection and interest between Canada and the United States are a guarantee of peace."

The first crop bulletin of Manitoba has just been issued and gives most favorable reports from all parts of the country. Seeding was general throughout the province on April 1st. Rain was needed at some places, and high winds did little damage, but wheat crops suffered no injury. The condition of hay meadows and pastures on July 1st was better than previous years. Butter and cheese-making promise to be carried on with greater energy than ever. A large number of factories are being established. The condition of live stock generally on June 1st was the best in a number of years, owing largely to a mild winter and the early date at which grass became sufficient for feeding.

Halifax Mail: The New York Scottish American Journal thinks that the most stupendous "confidence" trick on record was the obtaining by Sullivan and his associates of the Clan-na-Gael, the sum of \$300,000 from Irish sympathisers in America, not one tithe of which was ever used for any purpose directly or indirectly connected with the cause of Home Rule in Ireland. Perhaps so; but has the Journal, before venturing that opinion, studied carefully the biographies of certain eminent citizens of the United States now sojourning in Canada? Or has it heard of the New York firm of Grant & Ward, one member of which is at present, if we mistake not, representing the United States at some foreign court?

Dominion Illustrated, of the latest date, contains "The Judgment of Osiris," by "Hunter Duvar." This poem will, we venture to predict, be greatly enjoyed by those who have a taste for good literature and be conned by men of letters in succeeding generations—though it will, perhaps, never become popular. The style in which it is written is quaint, and it is full of the flavor of some of the old masterpieces. Many of the lines are instinct with poetry, and the descriptions of the "dread judgment place," of the Judge, "A Presence vast, majestic, magian, lone, The Great Osiris seated on his throne," and of Cleopatra, the woman in the case,—"A female form most delicately fair Of perfect symmetry and grace of limb, Who stood before the Judge, and looked at him With a proud regal port that seemed to be A challenge made to an equality," are very fine. Telegraphic Tips.

QUEBEC, June 17.—The ministers are nearly all absent campaigning, and everything indicates an early dissolution.

MONTREAL, June 17.—The new St. James' Methodist Church, one of the finest ecclesiastical structures on the continent, was opened for divine service yesterday. It has a seating capacity of 2,700.

LONDON, June 17.—The steel torpedo depot ship Vulcan was launched at Portsmouth a few days ago. She is the largest vessel the government has ever built. It is intended that she shall accompany a fleet and carry a large equipment of torpedo boats. She will form a floating workshop. The Vulcan is 6,620 tons burden, and 12,000 horse power.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., June 17.—Edward Swineford, of St. Louis, Mo., who has been here searching for the bodies of his wife and mother, who were lost on the express train, has been sent home a raving maniac. The knowledge of the fate of his wife and aged mother robbed him of his senses.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 17.—Newspapers here minimize the significance of the Czar's recent toast to the Prince of Montenegro, and declare that the foreign press received a wrong impression regarding the matter and exaggerates the importance of the Czar's utterances on the occasion.

LONDON, June 17.—Inquiry into the recent railway disaster near Armagh began to-day. Several witnesses testified that they had warned the officials of the train that it would be a risky proceeding to detach the rear cars on the incline. The detached cars attained a speed of sixty miles an hour when they collided with the train behind them.
