

Leafs And All-Stars Play To Tie In Hockey Classic

TORONTO (CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs, Stanley Cup champions, played to a 3-3 tie with the National Hockey League All-Stars in a robust game watched by 14,000 at Maple Leaf Gardens Saturday night.

The teams locked in mid-season form in the first and third periods but took things comparatively easy in the second.

Best for the Leafs was left winger Frank Mahovlich who gave a surprisingly spirited performance and scored two first-period goals.

The other Toronto goal was scored by veteran Eddie Litzenberger when he pumped in his own third-period rebound.

For the All-Stars, Bobby Hull of Chicago Black Hawks was a workhorse and scored the first goal of the night. Other marksmen were defenceman Marcel Pronovost of Detroit Red Wings and Henri Richard of Montreal Canadiens.

Mahovlich, chosen to the first

all-star team but playing for his own club, scored his goals on identical plays. Captain George Armstrong passed across the goalmouth and the Big M cutted the first.

One in an open corner, Litzenberger, one of the Leafs better performers, passed across to Mahovlich for the second one.

SCORES ON POWER PLAY
 Between the goals was a power-play effort by Richard while Toronto's Allan Stanley sat out a holding penalty. It was a three-way passing play with Detroit's Gordie Howe and Centre Henry of New York Rangers which Richard finishing off with a 15-foot shot directly in front of the net.

Hull's great goal completed the first-period scoring. The Chicago star on a boy burst through the entire Toronto team and let his shot go as he was falling backwards after taking a hit from the Leafs' Johnny Macmillan. Bower, moving out on the play, watched Hull's shot catch the upper part of the net.

Litzenberger's third-period goal, on which Mahovlich earned an assist, gave Toronto a short-lived lead. Less than a minute later Pronovost shot from two steps over the blue line and beat Simmons for the equalizer.

Both teams opened up and five minutes remaining and both had good scoring opportunities.

GOALENDING SHARP
 The All-Stars' outburst Toronto 3-3 in a game which saw a sharp goalending on both sides. Each club used two netminders—Gen Hall of Chicago played the first half for the stars and Terry Sawchuk, Johnny Bower played the first two periods for Toronto before giving way to Don Simmons.

It was the fifth time the game has ended in a tie since it originated 17 years ago. All pro teams are to play for the players pension fund.

The brisk first period ended in a 2-2 tie and both clubs scored again in the third period.

Three times the Leafs held a one-goal lead and three times the stars bounced back to even the score.

Howe, playing in his 15th game, took the all-time scoring leadership with an assist. He now has 11 points, one more than former teammate Ted Lindsay. But he didn't get a goal and still is tied in that department with former Montreal star Maurice Richard.

Both have seven.

EDMONTON (CP)—Quarterback Joe Kapp unleashed a mighty aerial attack Sunday night as British Columbia Lions smothered Edmonton Eskimos 40-1 in a Western Football Conference game before about 14,000 Edmonton fans.

Kapp fired three touchdowns and set up one by himself and another by fullback Nub Beamer with a first-half passing attack that accounted for 383 yards.

The University of California graduate made mincemeat of the Eskimos wobbly defence as he hit both long and short and never appeared to run out of receivers.

He caught halfback Ron Moe on a 13-yard scoring pass in the opening quarter and combined with speedy Willie Fleming for two more. The first for 30 yards came on the final play of the initial quarter and the second for 63 yards in the last minute of the first half.

Kapp and Beamer scored their touchdowns on one-yard plunges.

Drysdale Does Great Job In Taming Yanks On 3 Hits

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Don Drysdale, a 14-1, handsome part-time TV actor, pitched Los Angeles Dodgers to their third straight World Series victory over New York Yankees Saturday with a three-hit, 1-0 triumph.

Once again the Dodgers pinned the Yanks to the mat by taking an early lead. In this case it was only one run but it did the trick with Drysdale.

Dodger speed, young Jim Bouton's witness and the inability of the highly touted Yankee infield to come up with the big play at the right time added up to that lone run.

With one out in the first, Jim Gilliam worked the 24-year-old Yankee right hander to a 3-2 count and finally walked. Willie Davis lined out wickedly to Johnny Blanchard, who was filling in for the injured Roger Maris in right field.

Bouton was working carefully on Tommy Davis until he let his fifth pitch bounce into the dirt away from catcher Elston Howard for a wild pitch. Gilliam dashed to second.

Davis, hitting star of the series, then smashed a single through the usually dependable Bobby Richardson that rolled into short right centre, far enough to permit the speedy Gilliam to score the only run.

The futile Yanks gave the crowd of 55,912—largest in the history of Dodger Stadium—a thrill on the last out. Joe Peptonne tore into a Drysdale pitch and lofted it to deep right field near the Yankee bullpen. Fairly, who doubles as a first baseman or outfielder as the occasion demands, raced back and pulled it down about five feet short of home run territory.

New York had one big chance to get Drysdale. That opportunity came in the second inning when Mickey Mantle dropped a bunt single behind third base for his first hit of the series, and Peptonne was hit by a pitch. With men on first and second and nobody out, Drysdale was in trouble.

But the six-foot-six pitching giant was up to the occasion. He made Howard go after a high, hard one for a strikeout. Blanchard roled out to Dick Tracewski, advancing the runner to second and third with two outs.

Clete Boyer was ordered to walk intentionally by manager Walt Alton, loading the bases. Bouton was the next batter and Drysdale struck him out on three pitches.

Drysdale, a 19-game winner this year after winning 25 last year when he was chosen as top pitcher in the majors, had been saved for the Dodgers' home opener so that the left handers, Koufax and Johnny Podres, could pitch at Yankee Stadium.

He came through with a strong game all the way, striking out nine men and walking only one. He fanned Mantle, Howard, Tom Trues and Bouton two times each and got Boyer only one.

Besides Mantle's bunt single in the second, the only Yankee hits were singles by Tony Kubek in the sixth and eighth innings.

Bouton, who graduated from the Yankee bullpen in May, had trouble with his control. But he deserved a better fate. The Dodgers got only four hits off him in his seven-inning start and all four were singles.

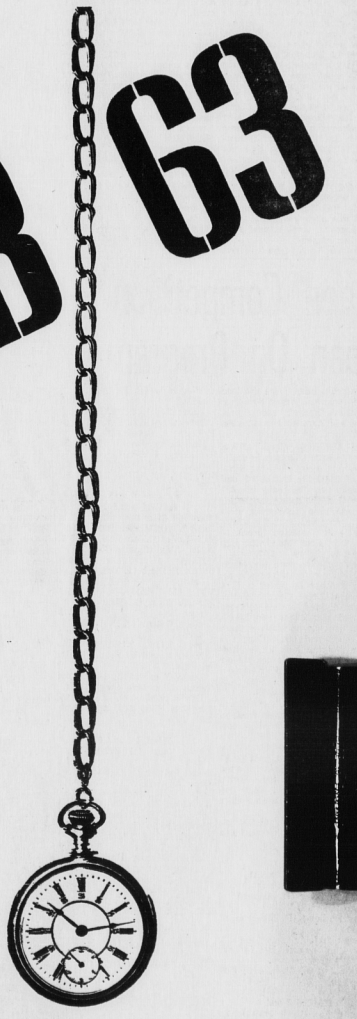
