## LET'S EAT

### Valentine's Day Cake With Cranberry Icing

"Many of the ladies reading this column would like to bake special cake for the dinner dessert or a party on Valentine's Day, Madame," said the Chef. "This old-fashioned cake with the cranberry icing you have just baked would be very appropriate."

"May I suggest a heart-shaped decoration of the candied cranberries I have just finished?"

**Old-Time Valentine Cake:** Sift together 1 1/2 c. already-sifted enriched flour, 1/2 tsp. salt, and 4 tsp. double-acting baking powder. In mixing bowl, cream 1 c. butter or shortening until soft. Blend in 1 1/2 tsp. nutmeg, 3/4 tsp. ground ginger and 2 c. sugar. One at a time, beat in 3 whole eggs and 2 egg yolks. Add flour mixture alternately with 1 1/3 c. milk; beat 1/2 min.

Spoon into 2 well-oiled lightly floured heart-shaped or 9" round layer cake pans, and into 4 individual heart-shaped or round pans. Bake 30-35 min. in moderate oven, 350 degrees F.

Turn out on wire rack to cool. Put together and cover with cranberry-butter icing. Decorate with a heart of candied cranberries.

Arrange on a large tray covered with white lace paper doilies, the large cake in the center, the small cakes at each side. In between, put green leaves and cranberries, or roses or other red flowers. Yields 12-20 servings. Or wrap in 1/2-ounce freeze part of the loaf for later use.

**Cranberry-Butter Icing:** Cream 1/2 c. butter with 2 c. confectioner's sugar until fluffy. Beat 2 egg whites until they stand in soft peaks. Gradually beat in 2 c. sifted confectioner's sugar. Fold into butter-sugar mixture. Stir in

6 tbs. syrup from candied cranberries, 2 tsp. fresh lemon juice, 2 drops vegetable coloring and 1 additional cup sugar. Use as directed.

**Candied Cranberries from Chef:** Cook together 5 min. 2 c. sugar and 2/3 water. Wash 3 c. fresh whole cranberries. With a needle prick skin of each. Add to syrup. Cook uncovered 10 min. Let stand overnight. Then drain. (Save syrup to use in frosting.)

**Spread berries to drain and dry on paper towels about 1 1/2 hrs. Then roll in 1/2 c. sugar. Spread in one layer in large shallow pan. Dry 1 hr. in very slow oven, 250 degrees F. Stir once.**

**Store in glass jars or covered plastic containers. Use in decorating cakes, cookies, pies, fruit cups, etc. They keep indefinitely.**

Drain Macaroni. Pour off grease from meat. Blend macaroni and meat and thoroughly season to taste. Add mushroom soup and can of milk. Mix well all ingredients and place in greased casserole. Bake at 350 degrees for 1/2 hour.

**PRUNE DESSERT**  
3 1/2 tbs. flour  
2 c. sugar  
2 c. milk  
2 oranges  
1/4 tsp. vanilla salt

2 eggs  
1 c. pitted prunes  
Mix flour, salt and 1/4 cup sugar. Add to hot milk gradually. Stir constantly until thick and add a little hot sauce to slightly beaten egg yolks. Return and cook two minutes. Add vanilla and cool. Arrange sliced oranges and prunes on dish. Pour custard and make meringue with egg whites and remaining sugar and 1/4 cup brown sugar.

**JELLY SALAD**  
1 package lemon jelly  
1 small c. shredded cabbage  
1 c. chopped celery  
1/2 c. chopped pickles  
1 small can pimiento

Dissolve jelly in one pint boiling water and tablespoon vinegar. Stir lightly. When jelly begins to set, add mixture. Put in moulds to set.
