The Troubles of Ireland.

Mahomed Jan at Work.

Progress of the Vice-Regal Party.

Special dispatch to Examiner.

DUBLIN, Feb. 3.

The Irish National Land League will depute Michael Davitt to enlist the support of the French and Continental newspapers in the efforts to relieve the distress in Ireland.

Wm. Shaw to-day disclaimed any pretensions to the leadership of the Irish party.

CLONMEL, IRELAND, Feb. 3.

A large number of unemployed people to-day made a demonstration before the Mayor's office, demanding work or bread, accompanying their demand with threats to sack the bakers' shops.

LONDON, Feb. 3.

Among the measures promised by the Government, to be presented at the opening of Parliament, is a Bill regarding the distress in Ireland.

LAHORE, Feb. 3.

Mahomed Jan has established a chain of armed posts on the Turkestan and Glauzee road, where his officers search the people passing to and from Cabul.

OTTAWA, Feb. 3.

Twelve hundred men are engaged on Section B, Thunder Bay branch railway, and 225 horses. Fifty miles have been sublet. The work under contract is progressing satisfactorily.

The Marquis of Lorne and Princess Louise will arrive in Montreal to-morrow about four p. m. They will stop two days at the Windsor Hotel. The Vice-Regal party will arrive here to-morrow about two o'clock p. m.

Ottawa has sent \$1000 to the relief of the distressed poor in Ireland.

The Government will take possession of the Pembina branch, it is said, on the 12th inst.

Two thousand persons have permanently settled in Manitoba during the last year, and fourteen in the North West. The bulk of these were from the other Provinces. About two thousand were from the Mother Country and a few from the United States.

AT THE WEST.—A large quantity of lumber has been made this winter, and several ships frames are being prepared. All the saw and grist mills are busy. A good deal of work has been done, but the dearth of cash is very general.
