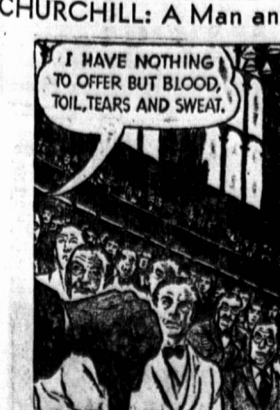

Junior Plays Following the two children's plays on Saturday afternoon, Prof. Shaw opened his remarks by complimenting the Association on the fine spirit being shown in the encouraging of children to take part. He hoped that as they grew older they would be able to assume more difficult roles. Speaking of the directors, he said he was very happy to commend them on their patience, and thought the two plays he had seen were extremely well done. The first of these, "Robin Hood," by the Grade Five pupils of Spring Park, Prof. Shaw thought understandable and interesting. The setting was simple but effective, and the costumes and make-up very good. West Royalty's production of "Hans Brinker" also received high praise, especially for the production end. Prof. Shaw thought the simple set was very well planned, the properties excellent, and the costumes and make-up entirely satisfactory. Mrs. Gwynneth Patterson, president of the Charlottetown Little Theatre, acted as chairman for the afternoon performance.

Evening Performance Speaking of Montague's production of "The Feminine Touch," the adjudicator stated he had thoroughly enjoyed this light comedy, and found it entirely suitable for the final play of the Festival. "The lines are clever and quite slick," he said, "and could quite easily have been spoiled by inexperienced players." Prof. Shaw agreed with the directors, Mrs. Douglas McGowan and Gilbert Clements, who had modified the set from the script, and said he found their interpretation of the play, emphasizing the comedy aspect, just the right touch. He found the tempo quite good, but thought the cast was sometimes a little slow on cues, and sometimes movements on the stage were rather awkward. Commenting on the individual characterizations, Prof. Shaw complimented Mary Stewart very highly for her role of Verity, saying he found her acting very good, especially in the first act, but suggested she concentrate a little more on projection. George Wright as Edwin Markham, had a clear idea of his character, and was quite competent in the role. Prof. Shaw told this actor he thought he might have slowed up a little to simulate the age necessary. He continued by commending Paul Dewar on a very fine comic interpretation of the role of Ullity Jones, and Elaine McLure on her complete handling of the straight role of Paddy Richards. Mrs. Gordon Coffin came in for very high praise for her role as Mrs. Wilkes, and Prof. Shaw said he and the audience had found Mrs. Coffin's interpretation most enjoyable as she played this comedy character to the hilt. Speaking of the work of Danny Murray as Brian Avery, the adjudicator said he found this character brought to life after the first ten minutes, and said he thought the bitterness had not been stressed sufficiently at first. Joanna Cooper, as played by Vivian Fraser was a very nice performance with the actress quite at home, and very natural. Two supporting roles, that of Phyllis, played by Joyce Higginson, and Mrs. Webb, by Iva Docherty, Prof. Shaw said he found very nicely played.

Creative Effort

Before giving his final adjudication of the Festival, Professor Shaw expressed his regret that so many had remained absent from the Festival Finals, and wondered if they did not think the movement was worth while. He stressed the need throughout Canada for culture of this type, stating that drama is a purely local, creative effort, not depending on any influence outside the community, and should be strongly supported by everyone interested in this purely Canadian movement.

He continued by asking if it would not be possible to change the time of the Festival to late Fall, and said he was being quite selfish in this proposal as he was a Governor of the Dominion Drama Festival. If this could be arranged, he said, then it might be possible for some of the entries from the Provincial Festival to participate early in the new year in the Regional Festival of the Dominion Drama Festival. He expressed the regret of the D.D.F., that this Province had had no entries in the Dominion Festival for two years, and wondered if this change of time might make future entries possible. "You have the talent," he said, "Have it represent your province in competition with the rest of Canada. Aim your sights high, remembering that your acting talent is comparable with the rest of the Dominion."

Before introducing the adjudicator, the chairman, Dr. L. W. Shaw, expressed the appreciation of the Festival Association to the Preliminary Adjudicators, and also to the radio and press for their support of this cultural movement. He also thanked the hard-working stage crew on behalf of all groups participating for their enthusiastic support, and Prof. Shaw for his wonderful contribution.

ADOPT PROPOSALS The conference communique said the following proposals submitted by Eden were adopted: "In order to facilitate the early and simultaneous cessation of hostilities, it is proposed that: "A. Representatives of the two commands should meet immediately in Geneva and contacts should also be established on the spot. "B. They should study the dispositions of forces to be made upon the cessation of hostilities beginning with the question of regrouping areas in Viet Nam. "C. They should report their findings and recommendations to the conference as soon as possible."

The announcement said the six non-Communist and three Communist nations at the conference agreed the date of the first military meeting should be agreed to before next Tuesday. For this purpose, the conference will resume again Monday, it said.
