## Man Acquitted In Robbery Case Found Shot

**BOSTON, (AP)** — George D. O'Brien, 44, who two months ago was acquitted of a charge of participating in one of the country's major unsolved thefts — \$681,700 from an armored truck through in 1952 — was found shot through the head Thursday. Doctors held little hope for his recovery.

O'Brien was facing indictments on charges of receiving stolen money and the threat of income tax trouble hung over him.

His wife and eldest son, George Jr., 20, are under indictment on charges of receiving stolen money, some of the truck loot, taken while guards sipped coffee in a drug-store.

O'Brien was indicted and tried after the government claimed he suddenly burst into riches from near poverty, purchasing his modern home, three automobiles in two years and otherwise exhibiting wealth from an unexplained source.

## Red China To Send Diplomatic Mission To U. K.

**LONDON (Reuters)** — Britain announced Thursday Communist China will shortly send a diplomatic mission to London for the first time since Mao Tse-tung's regime came to power 5½ years ago.

A foreign office spokesman emphasized Thursday night, however, that the move is not connected in any way with Communist China's bid for United Nations membership. Nor does it mean that the two governments soon will enter into full diplomatic relations with the exchange of ambassadors.

Britain sent a charge d'affaires to Peiping in January, 1950, upon recognizing the Communist regime. Negotiations for full diplomatic relations broke down six months later.

Peiping's decision to send a diplomatic mission to London followed private talks at the Geneva Far East conference between British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and Chou En-lai, Chinese Communist premier and foreign minister. Britain is the only Western nation represented at Geneva which recognizes the communist regime.

### U.S. INFORMED

The United States was kept fully informed of the course of Eden's talks with Chou on the issue. The U.S., like Canada, does not recognize the Peiping government.

Prime Minister Churchill announced the decision in the House of Commons with a brief statement.

The government spokesman said Thursday night the move indicated a slight up-grading in diplomatic relations between the two countries but was more of a "polite" gesture than anything else.

## Makes Appeal For Log-Cabin Parsons

**LONDON, (CP)**—Most Rev. Dr. Harold Sexton, Anglican archbishop of British Columbia, Thursday appealed to British churchmen to help him in recruiting young men to become "log-cabin parsons" in the Canadian West.

Dr. Sexton told the annual meeting of the British Columbia and Yukon Church Aid Society:

"Our most urgent need is for men—young men of high calibre, practical, pioneering, hard-working, evangelists who can be trained to meet our problems face to face."

He said the task of the Anglican Church in Canada is to keep pace with the material development of the country.

Dr. Sexton's see covers 500,000 square miles from Vancouver far into the Yukon.

## Strange But True

Has the human brain ever been measured? The capacity of the skull ascertained? Yet, in recent years the capacity of the skulls of over a score of eminent men were measured. Result: they averaged 1665 c.c., as compared to 1560 c.c. general average, which was derived from 110 individuals.

The brain weight of these 20 odd persons in the eminent class, showed an average increase of 93 grams over the average brain weight of 1387 grams. In other words, the greater brains are accompanied by higher faculty. But a few unusually small brains have been found to contain fully as much gray matter as the large ones.

Today, as never before, we are witnessing a reversion to the herd instinct disguised under technicalized forms. Everyone is troubled by worry; even those who feel secure today are concerned about tomorrow. And no government is free of finance and unemployment worries, which threaten their peace and happiness. The unemployed don't know who is to blame for their bitter lot. If there is a culprit, he has not been named, but there is no denying that man is being crushed and dehumanized and depersonalized.

The problem facing most towns is how to raise money, but officials in the town of Adaisville, Georgia, are faced with the problem of how to spend it. This unique situation was brought about by a fellow who went west, made a fortune, and willed a part of it to his home town.

W. A. Graham died two years ago, and his gift has been growing ever since, so that the mayor and city council face the problem of how to spend money rather than how to get it.

The town's finances are "fair for a small place with a population of only 1000," said the mayor, and he pointed out that Adaisville's only indebtedness is for sewer bonds, and its tax rate is only 12 mills. That takes care of all the municipal functions, including the one-man police force.

The money left by W. A. Graham may be used to build a municipal park.

How happy our own mayor and city council would be if some grateful native son of Charlottetown would make himself a fortune and at his death, will a large slice of it to his home town.

The city councils everywhere have their headaches nowadays, and the city council of Paris, Mo., is no exception.

Paris has its own electric light plant. It also has a number of citizens who refuse to pay their personal taxes, but since the amounts in most cases do not justify court suits, council cut off electric power from all tax delinquents, strong but true.

Changing from pigs to humans. How would you like feeding a family of 89? Let's see how the Rev. John Vogel of Kentucky performs this magic feat. His family includes his wife, Marguerite, 39, his daughter, Gladys, 20, and a grand total of 86 adopted children.

## Britain Refuses U. S. Request For Permission To Search Ships At Sea

**LONDON** — (Reuters) — Britain has rejected a United States request that American warships be allowed to search British ships at sea for arms bound for leftist Guatemala. Other West European governments are reported planning to follow Britain's lead.

Britain's refusal topped a wave of disapproval which swept through most of Europe's maritime nations after the American proposal was made public in Washington Thursday.

The United States made the search request tentatively as one of a series of measures designed to prevent shipments of arms reaching Guatemala from behind the Iron Curtain. Officials in Washington explained the searching of ships on the high seas would be made only as a last resort.

### APPROPRIATE ACTION

A foreign office spokesman gave Britain's reply Friday. He said Britain has informed the United States that she does not recognize

him to pick up an unwanted baby whose mother was dying.

## Thoughts For Our Time

### PREPARATION FOR MARRIAGE

From the evidence around us it is hard to ignore the fact that June is the month of brides. The newspapers each day present a large number of marriages or proposed marriages. There is something, no doubt, in the freshness and beauty of nature at this time of year which is sweetly in harmony with young love, with the happiness of marriage, and with the hopeful embarkation on life together of a young man and his bride.

One often wonders why something so beautiful and so sublime, even from a natural point of view, should be considered so lightly. Especially among those who are entering marriage, is this thoughtlessness a thing much to be regretted. Preparation for many lesser things is frequently much more rigorous and exacting. Take, for example, the care expended on preparing for examinations, or the very strenuous conditioning for athletic contests. These things last only a very brief time. Marriage is for life; how can it possibly begin well if it is prepared for in only a few weeks, or only from a materialistic point of view?

Economic preparation for marriage is important, no doubt, but psychological and spiritual preparation is equally important. Merely by making a contract one cannot change from a single person, with the point of view of a single person, to a person who must share his whole life with another. If one contemplates living with a person for the rest of his life, is it not reasonable that adjustments of mind, desire and habit be made? Should not one strive to understand and accommodate himself to his life partner?

Love both demands and facilitates this. When it is neglected, it is often not too long before we hear the cry of "incompatibility."

Spiritual preparation for marriage is, of course, very much out of date. There are very few who consider the help of God as a reality or a necessity. Yet look around you. There are mountainous problems within the home itself which cry for divine assistance, even before married people step out into social, commercial, or national life. All the insurance policies in the world can never substitute for the grace of God. If we need it in our daily life as single persons, we need it twice as much in marriage.

"The number of marriages which 'go on the rocks,' so to speak, is so appalling, that it sometimes produces a bitterness in youth. During the last two months I have come across two university students, advanced in their courses, who look upon marriage with a cynical eye. "Why look forward to
