

Five Reds Freed In U.S.; 9 Others Get New Trials

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court Monday threw out the conviction of five Communist party leaders on charges of plotting to teach violent overthrow of the U.S. government.

In the same decision the court ordered new trials for nine other California Communist party officials who had been convicted on the same charges.

The ruling, a majority decision, turned the five completely free.

The 14 Californians were sentenced in Los Angeles to five years imprisonment and fines of \$10,000 each. They were convicted Aug. 5, 1952, after a six-month trial.

The appeal was the first major case under the Smith Act to reach the Supreme Court since 1951. In that year the court upheld the act and the conviction in New York of Eugene Dennis and 10 other officials of the Communist party.

Heading the group was William Z. Foster, who was convicted on the same charges.

Requirements for 4-H Sewing Club work include: First year, patch, buttonhole, knitted square, seams, teatowel, embroidered sampler. Second year, knitted scarf, mending, applique, matched and skirt. Third year, hemstitching, bound buttonhole, mitts, darning, crocheted dolly and blouse. Fourth

year, socks, book of sample stitches and a dress.

The pupils of Grades V and VI had on display as their class sewing, aprons, pot holders, beanies and bureau scarves.

Those who completed their work successfully further developed their talent by making a drindle skirt for themselves.

The linen teatowels and embroidered end table covers made by the pupils of Grades 11 and 1V looked very attractive. A section of Grade 111 embroidered fancy doilies.

The girls of Grades 1 and 11 displayed their doll aprons, while the boys of Grade 1 had a fine showing of wooden toys made from plywood.
