## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

### "Presbyterian" Speaks Again.

SIR,—In the Weekly Guardian of the 17th inst. I observe a reply to "Presbyterian." The Guardian says: "In reply to 'Presbyterian,' we have to say that the misunderstood our reference to the manner in which the letters were obtained. It may have been fair or it may have been foul. Not knowing which, we had nothing to do but denounce the evil that we knew of." If the Guardian did not know by what means the letters were obtained, then there was more need that the Guardian should have acted more cautiously before publishing them and ascertaining by what means they came into the hands of the Guardian's correspondent; and further, the Guardian should have denounced in the severest terms the utter want of honesty and honor on the part of his correspondent in revealing their contents. In regard to my views of clergymen taking a leading part in political matters, I have only to say I am not a bigot, and have not the least fear nor do I care for priests pointing to Protestant approval of such matters, more especially as my views are held by clergymen who stand head and shoulders above their fellows in intelligence and as preachers of the gospel in the various sections of the Protestant Church, not only in Canada but in the old land. I feel that my opinions are not laid on loose foundations, knowing, as I do, men whose opinions are worth listening to holding the same views. I know nothing about the intelligence of the people of Tignish or Charlottetown, but this I do know, that on election day, and for more than a week previous thereto, I was questioned by dozens of electors, who were at a loss to know what was the meaning of "unrestricted reciprocity," and others again wanted to know what was the meaning of discrimination against the Mother Country. This fact alone speaks for itself. I have not a single word to say against the intelligence of the people of Prince Edward Island. I did find, however, that a great many people required information on the above points, and I have only to repeat what I said formerly, that in the late Dominion election the people did require instruction, and I see no harm in the clergy giving them that information which they needed. They have just as good a right to do so as any layman. As I have no wish to continue this correspondence further, you will not hear from me again on this matter.

### Mr. Parnell speaks.

HE ISSUES AN ADDRESS TO THE NATIONAL LEAGUE OF GREAT BRITAIN.

Parnell has issued an address to the members of the National League of Great Britain calling on them to ignore the convention summoned by Irish whigs under the shadow of English influence and to maintain the attitude of a self-respecting people, to assert the principles of national independence, to show the spirit of a fearless race and to declare that Irishmen shall alone regulate the conduct of Irish business. The seceding members of the league of Great Britain, he says, having resolved to make the organization an English electioneering machine, I have, pending a meeting of the convention, constituted what I shall call a provincial executive, consisting of those members of the old executive who have been faithful to Ireland, and of representative Irishmen residing in England, whose names are a guarantee of their worth and patriotism. Around this executive I ask my fellow countrymen of Great Britain to rally in the interests of a free and independent Irish party.

### A Serious Riot.

GROWING OUT OF THE DESTRUCTION OF A HINDOO TEMPLE IN BENARES.

A Benares despatch of the 17th says: The excitement in Benares, originating from the demolition of a Hindoo temple by the authorities, increases hourly, and already several serious riots have occurred between the disturbed natives and the local authorities, who are supported by British troops quartered in that vicinity. The soldiers are guarding all banks and public buildings and occupy many points of vantage throughout the city and district. All the shops in the city are closed. In spite of the efforts of the local officials, police and military, and natives, who were in a state of semi-revolt, cut the telegraph wires, looted the railway station, and plundered the railway treasury chest of about 300 rupees. The local authorities summoned a large number of volunteers and succeeded in arresting one hundred of the most violent rioters. These arrests resulted in quieting the disturbance, for the present at least.

### How to Tell Good Oats.

A writer in the Scientific American says good oats are clean, hard, dry, sweet, heavy, plump, full of flour, and rattle like shot. They have a clean and almost metallic lustre. Each oat in a well grown sample is nearly of the same size. There are but few small or imperfect grains. The hard pressure of the nail on an oat should leave little or no mark. The kernel when pressed between the teeth should clip rather than tear. The skin should be thin. The size of the kernel will be less in proportion than the skin is thick. The color of the oats is not very material, but white oats are generally thinner in the skin than black. Again, black oats will grow on inferior soils. Short plump oats are preferable to large, long grains. Bearded oats must have an excess of husk. Oats are not necessarily bad because they are thin skinned or bearded; but they must contain a less amount of flour per bushel than thin-skinned oats without beards.

HOG CHOLERA.—Mr. Geo. W. Ross of Vanceboro Me., has lost 40 hogs from hog cholera during the past few weeks.

STRUCK BY THE TRAIN.—A man named Jenks was struck by the Picton accommodation train about half a mile west of Steiwacke one day last week. He was thrown about ten feet in the air and about fifteen feet off the track. His injuries are not considered fatal. Jenks is quite deaf and did not hear the train approaching.

A BIG INDUSTRY.—The New Glasgow Iron, Coal and Railway Company has floated its stock to the extent of one million dollars and has given out the contract for the erection of blast furnaces. The Company owns large deposits of iron ore, deposits of limestone and coal mines all within a radius of ten miles of the site of its furnaces.

A MURDEROUS ITALIAN.—Placido Carotta, an Italian, made a remarkable attempt to kill his wife at Boston on the 16th. He bound her hands, gagged and blindfolded her, and had a rope around her neck to hang her to a door, when neighbors arrived and prevented the consummation of the tragedy. The woman was unconscious, but was restored in a short time. Carotta had a coffin in the room already for her.

SEVERE WEATHER.—A recent despatch from Denver, Colorado, says: Reports from the Southern Ute Agency are to the effect that Indians have lost nearly all their stock by heavy snow storms. The snow covered the ground to a depth of four feet and horses and cattle by the thousands starved to death. The Loches, Mowaches and Capotes had 17,000 horses and as many cattle, of which they lost all but 15 per cent. The Apaches in New Mexico, who own the largest herds of sheep and horses of any people in America, lost their entire herds by the storm and their losses are incalculable.
