Word has been received here of the death in New York on Saturday evening of Fred P. Duffy in his 59th year. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John P. Duffy of this city. His father was butler at Government House for 62 years.

In his younger days the late Mr. Duffy was employed at the Victoria Hotel. About thirty-years ago he left here on appointment as valet to Lord Neville, during his tenure of office at Ottawa. Later he accepted employment with the Mount Claire Hotel in New Jersey. At the time of his death he was manager of the St. Moritz Hotel in New York City.

He leaves to mourn his wife, the former Eileen Mosher, R.N., of New Orleans, Ohio; brothers, James G. Duffy and John A. Duffy; sisters, Mrs. Kathleen Hennessey, Mrs. Louis Arsenault, and Anne, all of Charlottetown. His funeral will take place Wednesday morning; burial in Defiance, Ohio.

Mother And Small Daughter Reunited

TORONTO (CP)—Marika Masaros, 12-year-old Hungarian refugee, ran tearfully to her mother Friday night at Toronto's Malton airport, ending a three-year struggle to unite the pair. Marika arrived not knowing where her mother, Mrs. Margit Anasiewski, was in Canada. The pair had not seen one another since 1947, when the mother left Hungary.

Marika's arrival caught Red Cross officials by surprise and they had to start a hurried search for her mother. Mrs. Anasiewski, whose first husband, Marika's father, was killed in the Second World War, was located in Toronto and taken to the airport for the reunion.

The Soviet officials who granted her visa warned her not to go to Canada with the child who filled with wild people who would eat her, she said.

Need For Educational Reform Stressed In Teacher's Address

"The need for educational reform and the fact that too many of our boys and girls are not getting as good an education as they should is of very grave concern to the Federation," stated Miss Estelle Bowness, General Secretary of the P.E.I. Teachers' Federation, in an address on "The Need for Reform in Education on P.E.I." at a meeting of the Prince Street Home and School Association on Thursday, November 29.

Miss Bowness said that the supply of trained teachers is desperately low, and stated "We are confident that most of the criticism levelled at the schools today is due to the misfits and unqualified persons filling in as teachers."

Advocating a minimum of grade twelve, plus one year teacher training for entrance to the teachers' profession, Miss Bowness emphasized that this alone was not the complete answer. Higher salary to attract competent teachers who would make teaching their life work, was a prime necessity in the development of the profession.

AA's Conference Held In The City Over Week-end

"Alcoholism is a disease that attacks body, mind and spirit, which by himself, the alcoholic cannot control." This was the expressed conviction of one of the speakers addressing the public meeting sponsored by Alcoholics Anonymous at the Capitol Theatre Sunday afternoon, part of a program arranged for the Central Zone Conference (Maritimes) held in Charlottetown over the week-end. A member of the Amherst group was chairman for the occasion. In keeping with the policy of this organization officials and speakers were identified by first names only.

The problem of the alcoholic was portrayed very vividly by three speakers from various AA groups in the Maritimes—one, a Springhill miner; another, a Sydney businessman; the third, a commercial traveller from Moncton. Each described his personal struggle with this problem, attributing their present sobriety to "the grace of God, and Alcoholics Anonymous." They told how they had begun drinking — two of them early in life; one when he was 28. One had been a sailor. "I drank in very port in the world, but could not describe the one of them to you." This man told of swimming 2 1/2 miles to the coast of Spain such was his craving for drink. Another speaker in telling of his experiences, described alcohol to the alcoholic as "the burglar of the brain... attacking conscience; will remove the intelligence."

The last speaker outlined the 13 stages through which the alcoholic passes before reaching the bottom, "without friends, job, credit... ruined, his family in disgrace... a wreck, physically, morally, and mentally."

The AA program was emphasized by all speakers: admittance of the individual that he is an alcoholic; his acceptance of the fact; his willingness to seek help from a higher Power; a sincere effort to clean up the mess he has made of his life, and to make amends for what harm he has done, and the helping of others to overcome similar trouble. In between the guest speaker's addresses, the chairman and others read material pertinent to the question: AA's 12 steps for the individual; AA's 12 steps for the group; a dissertation on pride written by the chairman; a service he asserted, kept many alcoholics from joining. The meeting closed with the recital of "The Lord's Prayer."

At 5:30 a banquet for the members and their friends was held at the Y.M.C.A., at which several speakers were heard. The conference wound up with a singing at local group headquarters highlighted by a number of inspirational talks by outside members.
