DEATH OF REV. THOS. DUNCAN.

We greatly regret to hear of the death of paralysis, at his home in Scotland, of the Rev. Thomas Duncan, formerly the esteemed pastor of St. James' Church in this city. A telegram announcing the sad event was received this morning by Mr. F. W. Hyndman. The news will be a great shock to his relatives and many friends in Charlottetown.

GOVERNMENT POND.

We plead "not guilty" to the charge of not saying anything about the shameful condition of Government pond. The EXAMINER has repeatedly directed attention to this matter. More than that we have suggested the removal of the mud in the winter time, by farmers, for manure, and a plan for the future improvement of the locality. That we have said nothing about it this spring is true, though the brown ugliness of its surface is already offensive to the sense of sight, if not of smell. We are none the less convinced that this matter affects the good name and fame of Charlottetown as well as the good health of citizens. Summer visitors cannot be expected to stay among us when there is such a place at the entrance of our park, on one of the principal thoroughfares leading to the city. Certainly the cleansing and improvement of Government Pond is one of the duties which ought to be pressed heavily upon the attention of the authorities until it has been performed. Apart from the matter of the Pond, the old bridge is disgraceful. We were promised a new stone bridge two years ago. If we mistake not, Mr. Harris, the architect, has informally submitted to the authorities a plan for the improvement and ornamentation of the locality. We suggest that this business be attended to in the coming season. A pumping station, for sewerage will, we understand, be erected in the vicinity this year. Why not have the whole matter attended to at the same time?

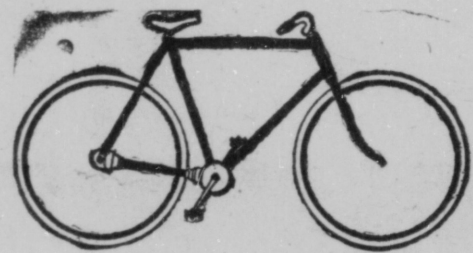
"A MATTER OF INTEREST."

The Patriot of last evening contained the following telegram:

MONTREAL, May 4.—The market value of the stock of the great railway corporation is a pretty sure barometer of the commercial prosperity of the country through which the railway runs and derives its patronage. It is therefore a matter of interest that the stock of the Canadian Pacific Railway should reach par during the period of Liberal administration. The important fact is recorded in the London market and was followed closely in New York and Montreal. Holders of stock cleared over one and a-half millions.

It cannot be forgotten that the Liberal party denounced the building of the Canadian Pacific Railway as ruinous to the country, said that it would "exhaust the resources of the British Empire to build it," and declared that "it wouldn't pay for grease for the wheels." In view of these facts, the report that the stock of the Canadian Pacific Railway has reached par under a Liberal administration is indeed "a matter of interest."

A BIG DIFFERENCE.

A few years ago the Liberals and their friends were boasting an expenditure of \$36,000,000 out of the consolidated fund of Canada. But now they are witnessing an expenditure of close upon \$42,000,000 without a murmur. In 1895, when the expenditure out of consolidated fund was about \$36,000,000, Mr. McMillen, M.P. said in Parliament, (see Hansard, page 3,265.)

"I believe we could reduce the expenditure of this country by five or six millions if the Government were only ready and willing to consent to it."

Instead of making a reduction of five millions, an addition of five millions has been made; and neither Mr. McMillen, nor the Patriot nor Guardian, nor any other leading Liberal, man or organ, has a word to say other than "it is all right." But a few tax-payers are beginning to think about the matter.

THEY DESERVE NO CREDIT.

The Guardian says: "If our recollection serves there was a time, not so very long ago, when the esteemed EXAMINER did find some credit due to the government of the day for good times, surprises and other things. And it is a poor rule that will not work both ways."

All of which is quite true. But the Guardian forgets that in the period referred to the "good times" followed a judicious and timely reversal of the fiscal policy of the country and the application of a policy under which capitalists and enterprising men-of-business were induced to establish manufactories, and artisans and laborers were set to work,—receiving wages which flowed into the channels of commerce, promoting the circulation of money and general prosperity. For this prosperity the political party which changed the fiscal policy might properly claim some credit. But the party now in office,—what have they done? They have simply swallowed their pre-election declarations and promises and carried out, in the main, their predecessors' protective policy. They deserve no credit for present prosperity.
