## THE SENATE AND THE FRANCHISE BILL.

Another Opportunity Given

TO PERMIT AN APPEAL TO THE JUDGES.

But the Bill Will Probably Pass Both Houses.

OTTAWA, June 3.—After a vigorous discussion in the Senate, yesterday, Senator Miller's amendment to the franchise bill was adopted last evening by a division of 13 to 34.

Hon. Mr. Mills had refused to accept the amendment. The amendment thus carried is word for word with the amendment rejected by the House of Commons on May 18th by a majority of 40. There is therefore a conflict between the two Houses.

The House of Commons will, on receipt of the amended bill, refuse to concur in this amendment as being repugnant to the principle of the bill, and it will then go back to the Senate for them to reconsider their action or abide by it. If they abide by it, then the plebiscite bill is thereby killed, because clause six of the plebiscite bill enacts that that the question shall be submitted to the electors under the franchise act of 1898. If there is no franchise act of 1898 there can be no action under a plebiscite bill.

The bill was reported at midnight and stands for a third reading to-day.

Senators Vidal, McDonald, (P. E. I.) Baro, Poirier, and Perley, five Conservatives, voted with the Government.

The Senate Conservatives who voted against the amendment to explain their position by saying that the government had refused to accept the amendment and though they approved of the amendment they did not feel like taking the responsibility of killing the bill and with it the plebiscite measure.

But is not reasonable to think that the government care less for the two bills than it does to prevent an appeal to judges in the two provinces that do not now have it.

### Sickness at Tampa.

TAMPA, June 2.—There is considerable sickness among the soldiers of the 11st New York volunteers, and although only one fatality has occurred so far, several members of the regiment are seriously ill. Most of the sickness is due to the change of weather, although long hours of drilling in the intense heat to which the Northerners are unaccustomed, have resulted in several prostrations.

German organs of public opinion are bitterly hostile to the United States. The papers teem with sarcastic comment on the alleged inactivity of the United States, attributing it "to a lack of courage" or to "unreadiness of its forces," especially to the notorious condition of insubordination of the American militia.

## TERRIBLE FIRE AT PESHAWAR

4,000 Houses Destroyed

LOSS ESTIMATED AT TWENTY MILLIONS.

The Greatest Fire On Record in India.

BOMBAY, June 3.—A terrible conflagration is raging at Peshawar, a fortified town of Northern India, the capital of the district of that name in the Punjab Province.

The fire has already destroyed 4,000 houses, doing damage to the amount of about twenty million dollars.

It is supposed to be the greatest fire on record in India.

### DETAILS OF THE FIGHT.

NEW YORK, June 2.—The Journal has a despatch from Cape Haytian, purporting to give the details of the Santiago fight. It says:

The torpedo boat Porter arrived at St. Nicholas with despatches for Washington. She left immediately, but before going to sea she left the following story of the fight with the Journal correspondent at the Mole:

The American squadron, augmented by the torpedo boat Porter, the auxiliary cruiser St. Paul and the protected cruiser New Orleans, formerly the Amazonas, approached the entrance to the harbor of Santiago at about 12.30 p. m., the Iowa leading.

Inside the entrance to the harbor was seen one of the warships of Cervera's fleet. Stripped for action.

As the American fleet drew near, the New Orleans was detached and steamed forward ahead of the Iowa, Texas and Massachusetts. One of the forts opened fire on her and she replied, the other two ships directing their fire at the battery on the Punta Corda within the harbor and to the westward of the position occupied by the Spanish ships. The latter replied to the fire and immediately became a target for the American ships engaged in the battle. She retired behind a protecting headland and was not seen again during the engagement.

The Iowa, directed by Captain "Fighting Bob" Evans; the Massachusetts, Captain Higginson; Texas, Phillip, and the New Orleans, Captain Folger kept up their

against the Morro Socapita and Punta Corda forts for two hours, their projectiles of enormous size, doing tremendous damage to the defences of the harbor. The mortar on Socapita and Morrow was battered almost into dust and the forms of Spanish artillerymen and infantry could be plainly seen lying for safety behind the neighboring hills. The auxiliary cruiser which joined Schley's fleet just before the battle took place, was hit by shells from the forts, and is thought she has been seriously damaged by the shells. After seeking the protection of a projected headland, the Spanish warships continued to fire projectiles over the hills toward the fleet, but they had no range, not even direction, to their shots, and the shells fell harmless into the sea.

That the number of killed and wounded on the Spanish side is enormous, no one doubts, for time and again the American shells hit the batteries squarely and amid the living masonry and dismantled guns the forms of men were described.

The damage done to the American fleet cannot be learned, but it is not thought any person was killed, if indeed, anyone was wounded.
