New York Race Commission Suspends Trainer Hirsch

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York state racing commission Tuesday continued suspension of trainer Jerome Hirsch until the end of the racing season here Nov. 16 and recommended that Theodore Georgakopoulos be barred permanently from all tracks in the state.

The action followed an investigation into the alleged stimulation of the horse Blue and Gold, which finished second in the first race at Jamaica track July 16.

Hirsch said he allowed Georgakopoulos to administer what the latter termed a "tonic" to the horse. It was from a formula he said his father, a pharmacist, used in Greece. The tonic contained morphine, a chemical analysis showed.

The commission, in continuing the suspension of Hirsch as trainer and owner, declared him "guilty of culpable negligence in permitting an unlicensed person access to his barn and to the horses under his care."

Fast Progress By Russian Hoop Players Says Expert

ROME, (CP)—A former American collegiate director said Tuesday Russia's basketball players have made 10 years progress in the last year and will endanger United States supremacy.

Jim McGregor, former director of athletics at Withworth College, Spokane, Wash., and now coach of the Italian national basketball team, said:

"If they (the Russians) continue to improve at the present rate they can knock the United States off in 1960 Olympic basketball the way they knocked Canada off in Olympic ice hockey this year."

McGregor returned Monday night from Bologna, where the Russians swept undefeated through the six-nation Mairano Cup tournament.

He said the Russians have good well-rounded players but still lack the exceptional stars the U.S. has. He predicted they will be second or third in Olympic basketball at Melbourne.

Don Campbell Blazes New Speedboat Mark, 225 mph

CONISTON, England (Reuters)—Donald Campbell Wednesday night set his world water-speed record from 216.2 to 225 miles an hour in his turbo-jet speedboat Bluebird.

He shattered his previous mark set on Lake Mead, Nevada, last Nov. 16.

Campbell roared through a crowd of spray at a speed of 286 miles an hour on his first run over the measured kilometre. The record time is the average of runs made within an hour of each other.

He was clocked at 164 miles an hour on his second run.

As Campbell, sweat standing on his brow, stepped from his craft he said: "She started rolling and rolling like mad. I have never heard such a row in my life. I nearly passed out. I don't know what happened."

Jack Hennemier Out As Coach Over Calgary Stampede

CALGARY (CP)—Jack Hennemier is out as coach of Calgary Stampede of the Western Interprovincial Football Union.

Directors of the club asked for his resignation Wednesday and general manager Bob Masterson said it was with much regret that the move had to be made. Hennemier joined the club last year.

Masterson said he was not in a position to make any announcement of a possible successor.

Hennemier's contract, believed to be for \$15,000 a season, would be honored in full by the club.

Assistant coach Tommie Thompson would remain with the club in his present capacity and would handle the club Saturday when Stamps meet Eskimos at Edmonton.

Marlene Stewart Wins 2nd Round U. S. Golf Ch'ships

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—Marlene Stewart of Fonthill, Ont., won her second-round match in the United States women's amateur golf championships Tuesday but a 54-year-old Philadelphia matron stole the spotlight from her youthful competitors.

Miss Stewart, Canadian champion and U.S. collegiate champion, defeated Kathleen Newton of Willoughby, Ohio, 6 and 5.

But the Canadian's nemesis in last year's championship, Mrs. Harrison Flippin of Philadelphia, produced the best match of the day when she almost beat Wiffi Smith, British and French women's champion. She carried Miss Smith to the 19th hole before losing out.

Little Brown Jug Classic Thursday At Delaware Fair

DELAWARE, Ohio (AP)—Ten three-year-old pacers, headed by favored Bachelor Hanover, were named Tuesday to start in the 11th annual Little Brown Jug classic Tuesday at the Delaware County Fair. The race will be worth \$52,000 for the jaunt over the half-mile oval.

The field is the smallest for the wheelie event since 1948, when Knight Dream triumphed over six other starters.

The drop from the 1955 field of 17 and a purse of \$66,608 was attributed to the heavy entry of sidetracked horses which discouraged many owners from keeping up early payments to keep their pacers eligible.

Each of the 10 named to face the starting gate paid \$500 Tuesday, boosting the contribution of each starter to \$960.

Connecticut Bans Moose Shooting

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP)—As of Tuesday there's a law in Connecticut against the shooting of moose.

As of last week, as far as anyone knew, there wasn't a moose in Connecticut. But on Saturday Victor Plesky found one in his garden in Ashford, in the northeastern section of the state.

He took pictures before a dog chased it off and showed them to state board of fisheries and game officials. They came around for a look at the animal tracks and hastily promulgated their law.

Lyle M. Thorpe, director of the board, said the state has had no previous prohibition of moose-hunting for the same reason as it has no law protecting elephants—nobody dreamed there was one around.
