Engineered Racketeering On Big Scale In New York

NEW YORK (AP) — The story of racketeering in New York's garment and trucking industries is a complex web of violence, death and fear.

Its shadowy presence flared into focus in the arrest of Johnny Dio accused as the master hoodlum who engineered the acid blinding of labor columnist Victor Riesel.

Dio is a personification of the strong-arm "shakedown" world. Around his suave, darkly handsome figure, you can trace the lurking power of the rackets. His career tells the story.

As recorded in indictments, police reports and accusations by prosecutors, it is a sequence of broken heads, of spilling acid on clothes, of cars dumped in the east river or set on fire.

Of setting up "paper" labor outfits, and then collecting \$1,000 a month from garment firms to keep legitimate unions out of their shops.

Of \$30,000 payoffs to help business concerns get rid of their unions.

Of \$500 - a month "protection" collections from terrorized truckmen in the mid-Manhattan garment district.

In the midst of this ugly maelstrom, for years has been the MURDER-GANG GRADUATE...

Johnny Dio was born 42 years ago on the lower East side as John Dioguardi. He graduated into a full-fledged hoodlum under the tutelage of Louis Lepke...

Dio first emerged as the heir of their domain in the late 1930s, when former governor Thomas E. Dewey, then a racketeer-busting special prosecutor, put him and his uncle, Jimmy Doyle, on trial for extortion.

The two dominated what was called the Five Borough Truckmen's Association, shaking truck-

men \$500 a month to operate, and the Garment Centre Truck Owners Association, which levied a tariff on every coat and suit manufactured here.

There was testimony of threats, beatings by hatchets and acid poured over clothing and into the motors of trucks.

At the end of prosecution testimony, Doyle and Dio pleaded guilty and went to Sing Sing for three to five years.

There was testimony of threats, dapper, hardened man. He managed to obtain charters for setting up AFL United Auto Workers union locals—a rival of Walter Reuther's CIO union of the same name.

Experts called Dio's outfits "paper locals." They were catchalls, trying to take over taxi drivers or any other labor group. He failed to take over the cabbies, despite bloodshed and violence.

Then he allegedly used his locals to protect garment industry companies who wanted to operate as non-union—selling them protection at \$1,000 a month here and in Pennsylvania.

RAKEOFF IN MILLIONS His "union" henchmen would walk into a plant, call it a "union shop," and drive out those trying to organize a legitimate union.

In 1953, he served 60 days in jail for failing to pay state income tax. While there, the AFL took away his charters for union locals.

At that time, it was reported he had income from shakedown alone amounted to \$1,000,000 a year.

He also owned a dress manufacturing business in Pennsylvania operating with non-union workers and was president of Rosemary Fashions. Until his arrest, he operated the Equitable Research Association Inc., a so-called labor consultation service.

The district attorney's office said it was an outfit in the business of "selling labor peace for a price."
