LIGHT FOR THE BLIND.

Mr. C. F. Fraser, superintendent of the School for the Blind, at Halifax, has issued an address to the public in which he states the results of the work of the school as follows:

- 12 per cent. in conducting or taking part in concert companies. 8 per cent. in pianoforte tuning. 8 per cent. in business. 4 per cent. in manufacturing. 12 per cent. giving instructing in or working at trades. 2 per cent. as agents. 2 per cent. in farm work. 2 per cent. in literary callings. 22 per cent. residing at home.

Our present buildings are adapted for the accommodation of sixty pupils. Seventy pupils are in attendance, and the school is overcrowded.

BAPTISTS IN CONVENTION.

Total Abstainers Only are Qualified For Baptist Membership. The Baptist Convention, at Berwick, Nova Scotia, was closed on Thursday evening.

On that day the committee on temperance presented the following report: The attitude of this convention towards the manufacture, sale and use of intoxicating beverages must be one of constant antagonism.

We believe total abstinence to be the only safe and right thing for the individual, and that whoever persists in a different course is an enemy of church membership.

It is our duty as a body of Christians representing the Baptist churches of these provinces to give declaration that shall make clear and public the sentiments of our churches against intemperance, and that shall at the same time deepen strengthen these sentiments.

We would further state our convictions that inasmuch as the traffic in intoxicants is a menace to the well being of society and state, that we have a right to look to our legislature for laws that shall protect us from the danger and that we should urge upon those who have to do with the nomination and election of candidates for parliament that they should see to it that those who shall be accepted as worthy of such responsible positions, who, with other qualifications, are consistent temperance men and who will give assurance that they will support every measure for the prohibition of the traffic.

In addition to this we must continue to require our Dominion and Provincial parliaments that they use whatever powers constitutionally belong to them in granting to us laws that shall prohibit the importation, manufacture and sale of all kinds of intoxicating liquors, and that we do not ask as a favor, but demand as a right.

It is also the opinion of this convention that inasmuch as the Liberal party of Canada have pledged themselves to grant a plebiscite on the question of prohibition, that the present Government be asked to make provision for this at an early date, and that when an opportunity is offered we urge upon all voters to emphatically declare themselves in favor of the prohibition of the legal importation and manufacture of liquor.

Whereas, the highest court of colonial appeal in Great Britain has recently decided that the entire control of the sale of intoxicating liquors is intra vires of the local legislatures of Canada and that the power over the importation and manufacture rests with the Dominion Parliament and hence the plebiscite taken in 1894 gave such overwhelming majorities in P. E. I. and Nova Scotia in favor of prohibition of the liquor traffic.

Resolved, That this convention do petition the legislatures of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and P. E. I. to enact laws prohibiting the sale of liquors in their respective provinces;

Resolved, That this convention do petition the Dominion Parliament in its next session for an act to prohibit the importation and manufacture of strong drink in Canada, and if a prohibitory law will not immediately be made for all Canada that the Dominion Parliament be requested to prohibit the manufacture and importation into any province where the sale of liquors within its borders; and
