Winners' Parade, Dance Wrap Up Alberton Ex.

ALBERTON BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — One of the most successful Prince County Exhibitions ever held at Alberton concluded last evening with the traditional exhibition dance. Music for square dancing was furnished by Leonard Barnett's orchestra, and for modern dancing the Bel Aires took over.

At the end of the parade were some of the horse champions and "out of respect to age", the 30-year-old exhibit of the only horsewoman present, Genevieve MacAusland.

SILVER TRAY — Elmer K. Smith was awarded the coveted Imperial Bank of Commerce silver tray offered for the best group of three dairy females in the show. This is the first time Mr. Smith has won the trophy, although he was believed to be a close runner-up last year. The trophy was presented by Gary Black, representing the bank, to the happy owner of a trio of beautiful holsteins.

George Kitson, veteran horse judge, made his services available to Alberton Exhibition again this year.

The horse division had several unusually interesting features. The youngest exhibit was a pony foal shown by Cliburne Locke and the oldest the 30-year-old horse shown by Genevieve MacAusland. The senior exhibitor was 82-year-old Lester Wallace, past president of the exhibition association, and the youngest was six-year-old Evan Locke, who assisted his father in showing his pony.

The youngest to appear alone with his exhibit was 10-year-old Brian Dewar, with 12-year-old Allison Clark, a close second.

Brendon Wallace received the Provincial Auto Paris special prize for best horse in the show,

and the D.L. Miller special for best horse in the general purpose class.

BEST DRAFT HORSE
Heber Profit received the D.L. Miller special for best horse in the draft class and the F. Earle MacDonald special for best progeny of dam.

Lorne Crockett won the Renie and Ogden special prize for best roaster.

In the pony class Robert Campbell showed the champion stallion and the reserve champion stallion also the champion mare. The reserve champion mare was shown by Colleen and Douglas Hayes. Other exhibitors of ponies who won prizes were Lorraine Gallant, Cliburne Locke, Linda Gard, Brian Dewar, Roy Culleton and Allison Clark.

CATTLE DIVISION
In the cattle division there were very fine showings of Holsteins and Guernseys. Ayrshires were less in number and there were only two Jerseys entered. There was a good showing of dual purpose Shorthorns.

The two Jerseys were shown by Sandford Phillips.

Clow Brothers, Glorice Cormier and Sons and Elmer K. Smith carried off the Holstein honors.

The Clows showed the champion and reserve champion junior males, the reserve champion male, and the best three animals.

The Cormiers showed the champion senior male, the grand champion female, the best two females on ROP.

GUERNSEY CLASS
Mrs. Mary Palmer and Sons received most of the high awards in the Guernsey class. They showed the champion senior male, the grand champion junior female, the champion and reserve champion senior females, the grand champion and reserve grand champion females. In first place were their group of three animals, their senior herd, their three animals (get of sire), their two animals (progeny of dam) and their two

females on ROP. Elwood Smallman and Son showed the reserve junior champion male, the champion junior female and the best junior herd. Bert Palmer and Sons showed the champion junior male.

Edmund Bernard was the only exhibitor of champion Ayrshires. They were champion and reserve champion junior females, champion and reserve champion senior females, grand champion and reserve grand champion females. He also showed the best herds and the best group of three animals.

Other exhibitors in this class were Lloyd Sharpe who showed best junior female calf; Walter Darrach who showed the best dry female born between July 1, 1961 and June 30, 1962, and James Wallace who showed the best dry female born before July 1, 1960.

Alden Gamble, Arthur Wallace and Son and Keith Barrett were the principal exhibitors of dual purpose Shorthorns. Mr. Gamble showed the champion senior male, the grand champion male, the reserve champion junior male, the reserve champion and reserve champion senior females, the grand champion female, the best group of three and the best senior herd. Mr. Wallace showed the champion junior male and the reserve grand champion male. Mr. Barrett showed the champion junior female, the best junior herd, the best three animals, the best progeny of dam and the best two females on ROP.

In the report of Hereford judging carried in yesterday's issue it was stated that Fred C. Ramsay was awarded both the "premier breeder" and "premier exhibitor" banners. Mr. Ramsay received the "premier breeder" banner but the "premier exhibitor" one went to Bruce Carruthers.

In addition to the honors reported for Mr. Ramsay, he also showed the best two animals, progeny of dam.

SWINE QUALITY
Swine were of good quality and there were a satisfactory number of entries.

Hudson Pridham and Son showed the grand champion Yorkshire female and the best three animals.

Alan Warren showed the best bacon hog and the best pair of bacon hogs (190 to 230 lbs). He also received the Don Campbell

special prizes to the boy or girl between 10 and 20 years of age for the best bacon hogs.

In the Landrace class Herman Smallman showed the grand champion boar, the best junior herd and the best three animals. Harry Pridham was awarded the grand championship for an exceptionally fine sow with estimated weight of about 700 pounds.

Frank Bryan showed the best sow over 18 months with litter.

SHEEP
W. A. Moose and Sons were awarded the MacAusland Woolen Mill special prize for the best flock of sheep. The Mooses and Edmund A. Bernard were the only exhibitors in the Oxford and Shropshire class. Sylvester J. F. Arseneault, Horace O'Brien and Edmund Bernard exhibited Cheviots. Edwin Hansen was the principal exhibitor of Suffolk.

Sylvester J. F. Arseneault showed the best pen of two market lambs and the best pen of four market lambs.

DOMESTIC SCIENCE
Domestic science exhibits were of excellent quality and there were a large number of entries.

Mrs. Douglas Adams won first for her dark fruit cake and Mrs. Milford Ellis had first for light fruit cake.

Mrs. Adams also had first for whole wheat or graham bread, fruit or nut loaf made with yeast, cultivated strawberry preserve and apple jelly.

Mrs. Ellis also received first for sweet mixed pickles, chowchow and honey.

Mrs. John Barbour, largest exhibitor in domestic science, had firsts for pound cake, sponge cake, light cake, marble cake, fancy mixed cookies, brownies, apple pie, bread and butter pickles, mincemeat, wild strawberry preserve, collection of fancy squares, gingersnaps. She also received a number of seconds, thirds and fourths.

Mrs. Ralph MacLennan won first for her collection of canned vegetables.

Mrs. William Mountain received first for dark soap and Mrs. Robert Woodside received first for light soap.

The Fry-Cadbury special prizes for chocolate cake were won by Mrs. Beecher Smallman, Mrs. Alvin Webb and Mrs. Garth Wilgie.

There is promise of continuing excellence in domestic science exhibits in the future as demonstrated by the success of three young contestants, 14-year-old Sheila Dunn, 13-year-old Lois Profit and 14-year-old Mary Gard.

Only gentleman to enter the competition this year was Walter Culbert, who won a first prize for bran muffins.

Blood Donor Clinics 110 Below Objective

Both of yesterday's concluding sessions of this week's series of Red Cross blood donor clinics succeeded in reaching the quota when 120 donors registered at Cardigan, and 154 at Montague. This brought the total number of donors enrolled during the four days to 971 of the 1,000 objective — approximately 90 per cent.

The fact that Cardigan reached its quota of 120 for the first time was termed most gratifying, especially to Alban Brothers, who is the chairman of the Legion-sponsored clinic there. He expressed appreciation to all who had co-operated in making the clinic a success, and particularly to the "Lions' Club" of Georgetown which was responsible for making arrangements which resulted in 24 employees of Bathurst Marine Industries being given time off to attend the Cardigan clinic. Members of the Legion ladies auxiliary assisted the mobile Red Cross blood donor team, and supplied the refreshments for the donors.

The spacious new Legion home at Montague provided excellent facilities for the efficient operation of a clinic of this type. Under the chairmanship of A.A. Fraser, the Legion committee which sponsored the Montague clinic gave the mobile team every assistance. Members of the Montague Women's Institute prepared and served refreshments provided by the Legion whose ladies auxiliary was also represented among the workers. Others who carried out various tasks in connection with the clinic included local nurses, and high school students.

F.A.S. Jones, provincial Red Cross blood donor chairman, last night expressed a sincere thanks to all those who have been donors or workers at this week's clinics. He said he hoped the deficit of 110 would be made up for when the next series of clinics are held at the Confederation Centre in Charlottetown during the last week of September.

Jammed Accelerator Suggested At Inquest
The death of John Alexander MacNeil of Dartmouth, N.S., came as a result of head and chest injuries received in a car accident at Cherry Valley July 27, a coroner's jury decided at an inquest at City Hall last evening.

Time of death was estimated at between 12.10 and 1 p.m. while the victim was enroute to the P.E.I. Hospital.

Among those giving testimony was Mrs. Catherine Fraser, daughter of the deceased, who was brought to the inquest on a stretcher. Mrs. Fraser had been one of the five passengers of the accident vehicle.

Mrs. Fraser said the vehicle was travelling towards Charlottetown on the Trans-Canada Highway around noon of July 27. She said she thought the car struck a rock on the highway; the vehicle speeded up, and the driver, MacNeil, tried to apply the brakes, but they wouldn't work.

COULDN'T STOP
The driver tried several methods but was unable to stop the car, which struck a mound of earth on the highway and jumped off the road over an embankment.

Mrs. Fraser said the car's brakes had been all right when the car stopped at a service station shortly before the accident.

Constable Maynard Roy of the RCMP, who examined the accident scene shortly after the mishap, said there was a lot of road construction going on in the area. The nearest signs warning of highway construction were two miles from the scene on the Wood Islands side of the Vernon causeway, he said.

Constable Roy produced notarized statements from passengers of the MacNeil vehicle and of two cars travelling towards Charlottetown. That time Mr. and Mrs. Robert Sherwood and son of Maryland, who were travelling in front of the MacNeil car, and Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Lydon, Massachusetts, and Lorne Bernard O'Reilly, Virginia, occupants of a car behind the MacNeil car.

PASSED ON RIGHT
The statements said the MacNeil car passed the Sherwood car on the right side at a high speed, hit a mound of earth on the highway, bounced and went over the embankment.

Gerald Allen of Nassau Street, Charlottetown, an engineer with the department of highways, explained that the signs were a long distance from the scene because there had been construction work in the village of Vernon.

Other witnesses included Dr. Malcolm Putnam; Vernon Joseph MacIntyre of Jelly's Funeral Home, who took the victim by ambulance to hospital; Robert Barry Dawson, Crapsad, foreman for Island Excavation, the company doing the highway construction; Cyril Michael Bolger, Vernon, flagman on the mound, and David Smith, Longworth Avenue, Charlottetown, a mechanic who examined the vehicle.

Mr. Smith said it appeared the car's accelerator had been stuck, and the main brake line was broken.

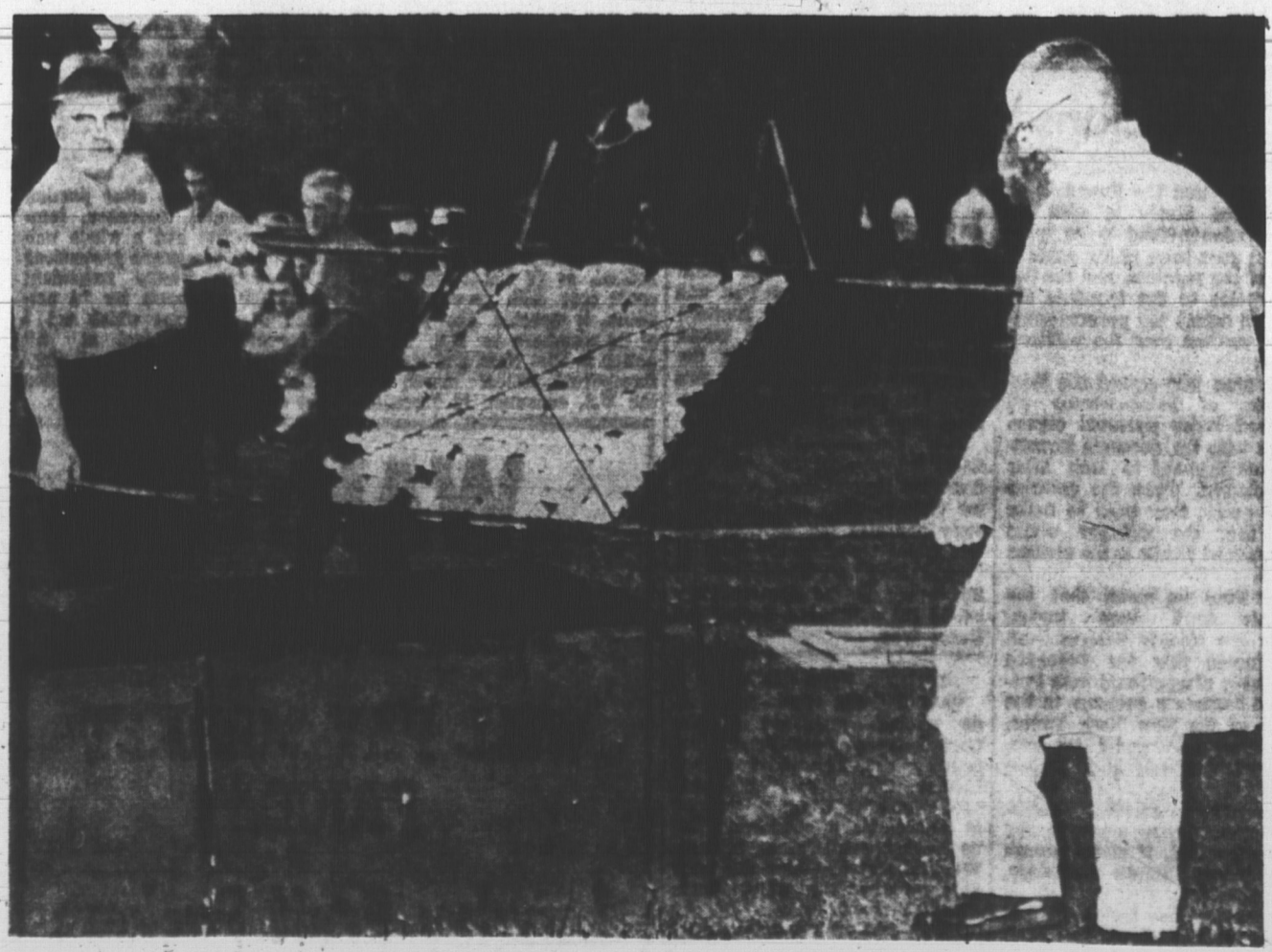
