two-ton Studebaker, was Mr. Enzor
Outway of Kensington. The truck
had been proceeding east on Water
Street and was turning into Spring
Street when it was struck by the motor-
cycle coming up Water Street. In
the opinion of the doctor, Mr. McKenna
was taken to the Prince County
Hospital and his condition last
night, was said to be improved. He
has a fractured leg and possible
head injuries. Damage to the motor-
cycle was extensive and the truck
suffered a blow-out in one tire and
some mechanical damage.—S

WORK PROGRESSING —
Work on the foundation of the
new Federal building at Summ-
erside which will comprise the Post
Office and Government offices, is
proceeding steadily. The work is
pouring the first floor cement. It
has been finished and this will be re-
inforced concrete slab floor. On the
largest day's work on this project
over 1,500 bags of cement were
used. The workmen are now wait-
