Stresses Importance Of Port Of Alberton

The indication that Alberton could become one of the great ports of call on the trade run between Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland was given in the Legislature yesterday afternoon by Mr. Fred C. Ramsay. (L-1st Prince) in speaking in the Budget debate. The development of a port at Alberton, Mr. Ramsay said, would be of great benefit to the First and Second Districts of Prince. He also stressed the importance of the boat harbor at Skinner's Pond which is to be undertaken and which will be of great help for the people of Tignish and Minnimeshah. The Trans-Canada Highway, he said, would be a great asset to the Province and he hoped that plans would be laid to take care of the outlying districts. He noted the needs of roads between Elmsdale and Tignish and from O'Leary to Knutsford.

Must Co-operate - He urged the cooperation of the Dominion and Provincial Governments with the farmers. "If the Governments do not cooperate," he warned, "they may drive the farmers into one of the strongest organizations that exist. They will become similar to business organizations with a 'take it or leave it attitude'."

He saw both advantages and disadvantages in the dragger question. On disadvantage would be the lack of good harbors to accommodate draggers which would result in many fishermen being deprived of their use. The other would be a flooding of the markets if too many were used. "On the other hand," Mr. Ramsay stated, "we may need draggers to compete with Nova Scotia and New Brunswick to get our share of the fish."

He expressed his agreement with the brief presented by the Federation especially with regard to floor prices. "If marketing is not our problem, he asked, 'why do we have floor prices today?' "The best system," he suggested, "would be to organize a buying and distributing board whereby farmers could control their own production. He pointed out that the average farmer could not change from a potato man to a dairy farmer overnight. "If he did," Mr. Ramsay said, "he would only aggravate the butter and cheese market problem."

He deplored the high costs which the farmer must meet in his production. "He is required to put enough fertilizer on his farm in three or four years so that the fertilizer bill equals the value of the farm. Tablestock potatoes are selling at 36 cents per bushel while a bag costs 30 cents."

Chinese Reds' Weakness In Air Proves Puzzling

By FRED HAMPSON HONG KONG, March 21 - (CP) - The Chinese Communists, whose all-powerful land armies overran China in one year, are sitting ducks for the Nationalist air force. Military experts are becoming puzzled at the Reds' continued helplessness against a relatively small air power. They have come to believe that the Reds' position in power may actually be threatened unless they can whip together some air defenses soon.

Huge Army, No Planes
